

UNITED STATES DICTATES

FOOD ORDERS TO CUBANS Steps Necessitated by Crisis. German Plot Brought People to Starving Point. (George Rothwell Brown in the Washington Post.)

German influences have become so powerful in Cuba that the population has been brought to the verge of starvation, and it has been necessary for this government virtually to place the island on rations. The embargo in surmounting are being fanned from Berlin, and cane burning has begun, a threat of ruin to the world's greatest source of sugar supply. The political and economic situation alike are acute. It became known yesterday that the United States has a military force at various places in the island, principally in the sugar districts, which is believed to be strong enough to maintain order, but these serious conditions naturally arouse grave apprehensions in Washington. The state department is keeping in close touch with our diplomatic and consular representatives there.

Consul-General Morgan has been sent to Havana, where he now is, as the representative of the war trade board and the food administration, which are conducting negotiations for furnishing food supplies. Mr. Morgan is assisted by Consul-General H. W. Harris, who recently succeeded James Linn Rodgers in that post at Havana. Mr. Rodgers has been transferred to Montreal.

To a certain extent the United States, which has become the dictator of the world's store of food, has been obliged to contribute to the circumstances constituting Cuba's distress, in order to stanch out the German intrigue which for months past has menaced the whole allied cause.

Insurance Spirit Spreading. The crisis has not been reached, and the developments of the next few days should demonstrate whether the disorders which have already begun can be checked without the necessity of taking extreme measures.

William E. Connally, the American minister, has kept the state department fully informed and has made frequent reports on the situation, which has steadily grown worse within the past few weeks. As a result of the machinations of German agents and spies, assisted by numerous trouble makers among the native Cubans, the spirit of insurrection has been spreading as the hunger of the people has increased.

There have been threats of sabotage, aimed at the sugar mills and the cane. According to information which reached the war department yesterday the burning of plantations has already begun.

TENTATIVE PLANS FOR SUMMER ENCAMPMENT

Knoxville, March 8.—Birth regiment staff officers, who assembled here late Thursday afternoon from over East Tennessee for a conference on plans, decided on tentative arrangements for the encampment of the regiment this summer. It was also proposed to hold similar meetings from time to time in order to discuss the best means of conducting the regiment, training of officers, equipping the increment and many other matters of importance.

FEDERAL AUTHORITIES ORDER THE RELEASE OF BOURGEOIS

New Orleans, March 8.—Federal authorities last night ordered the release from custody of Albert Bourgeois, southern manager for a national detective agency, who was detained at a police station here today on orders of Superintendent of Police Mooney. Not formal charges were pending against Bourgeois, the superintendent stating the federal authorities would be asked to investigate.

Bourgeois registered several weeks ago under the alien act as a citizen of Germany.
