RAIL STOCKS VARY; LIBERTY BONDS STEADY

New York, March 15.—Equipment issues comprising the war group were responsive to a fair demand at the opening of today's stock market.

Market conditions became more mixed in the afternoon. Specialties such as Industrial Alcohol, Maltine preferred and Sumatra Tobacco showed extreme gains of 3 to 4 points, but rails, notably Canadian Pacific and Coalers, were under persistent pressure.

Conflicting price movements continued in the dull final hour. The closing was irregular. Liberty 3 1/2s sold at 97.30 to 97.42, first 1s at 96.20 to 96.26.

ENCOURAGING OUTLOOK ON COTTON MARKET

New York, March 15.—There were some overnight sellings for February on the ring at the opening of the cotton market today, and first prices were unchanged to 19 points lower, with March relatively weak.

The market showed continued steadiness late in the morning, with May relatively firm on trade buying which was believed to be against spinners' calling.

Covering by March shorts became more active during the early afternoon, with that delivery selling up to 32.60c, or 40 points above last night's close.
