MEDICAL EXAMINERS MAY COME APRIL 6

Physicians Standing Test Admitted to Universal Practice—Experts Coming.

Washington, March 15.—An examination of medical students who have completed the prescribed course and of other applicants for commissions in the army medical reserve will be held at Camp Greenleaf, Fort Oglethorpe, Ga., early in April. The national board of medical examiners will go to Greenleaf for the purpose, it was learned today, and while there will consider plans to make that place the principal examining point for new medical officers. The headquarters of the board, however, will remain in Washington.

With the enlargement of Camp Greenleaf, the national board of medical examiners, with headquarters in Washington, D. C., is planning to establish a headquarters in the south. The southern headquarters will be located at Camp Greenleaf. This site was selected owing to the fact that doctors from all over America will assemble at Camp Greenleaf for military training.

Doctors who pass the examination held by this board are given a universal license to practice, not only in specific states, but in Canada, England, France and other foreign fields. Since the establishment of the national medical board, doctors who desired to take the examination have had to go to the headquarters at Washington. In selecting the medic camp at Camp Greenleaf the army officials took into consideration the fact that where before the doctors had to go to Washington to stand the examinations by the board of examiners, it would be more convenient to examine them here. To carry out this plan, the most prominent physicians of America will be stationed at Camp Greenleaf.

While this board does not have any direct connection with the army, the examination will be given to physicians who are in training at Camp Greenleaf and who desire to receive the universal license. However, the examinations will not be confined to the enlisted doctors at Camp Greenleaf, and doctors from all over the south will be invited to come to Chattanooga to take the examination. The examination which is given by the board not only licenses the physicians to practice in any state in the union and in foreign fields, but it also admits them to either the United States army or navy without further examinations.

There are five members of the national board of examiners, including Lieut.-Col. Victor Vaughn, of medicine at Ann Arbor; Col. Louis A. LaGarde, president of the board; Dr. W. L. Biering, of Philadelphia, and Dr. Rodman, of Philadelphia, secretary of the board. Dr. Rodman, it is understood, will probably be located at Camp Greenleaf permanently and will be in complete charge of the examinations at the camp.

While no official announcement has been given out as to the time the board of examiners will return to Chattanooga for the establishment of headquarters here, it is intimated that they will return about April 6, at which time the first examinations will be held.

At the dedication of the new medical auditorium, at which Surgeon-General W. C. Gorgas was present, he explained to the members of the camp the opportunity the students at Camp Greenleaf would have if the headquarters were established here.

ASSISTANT ATTORNEY-GENERAL DISMISSED

Marvin Campen, of Nashville, Let Out—Mayor Littleton's Brother Is Named.

(Special to The News.) Nashville, March 15.—Benjamin H. Littleton, a well-known member of the Nashville bar, was yesterday appointed to the position of assistant United States district attorney for Middle Tennessee, succeeding Marvin Campen, who was dismissed from the service yesterday. The appointment is effective today. It was made on the recommendation of District Attorney Lee Douglas.

Mr. Littleton graduated in the law department of Cumberland university in 1914, and since that time has been engaged in the practice of his profession in this city. He is a brother of Martin W. Littleton, of New York, Mayor Jesse M. Littleton, of Chattanooga, and the late John J. Littleton, of Nashville.

Mr. Campen sent a long telegram last night to Atty.-Gen. Gregory, who dismissed him "for the good of the service," saying he could not conceive the cause of his dismissal, unless it was brought about by misrepresentation made by some enemy.

His telegram dwelt largely on the history of the attempt to have Mal. E. B. Stahlman registered as an alien enemy, and intimated that he thought his dismissal was in some manner an outgrowth of that matter. He stated he had discharged all his duties in a diligent, conscientious manner.

As stated in the telegram Benjamin H. Littleton, who has been appointed assistant district attorney in Nashville, is a younger brother of Mayor Littleton of Chattanooga. He is a native of Boone county and graduated in law from Cumberland university at Lebanon in 1914, and located in Nashville soon after to practice his profession. He is well-known in Chattanooga and is a frequent visitor to his mayor brother.

While the appointment was a pleasing announcement to Mayor Littleton he said he had expected the appointment, as his brother told him a few days ago that Gen. Lee Douglas had asked him if he would accept.

JAMES AVORY BRYAN ORDERED INTO SERVICE
