PRIVATE PEAT CONFIDENT AS TO WHO WILL FINISH THE WAR

Bright and Cheery Speaker Impresses Hearers With the Wonders the War is Creating in the Minds of the Men Doing Actual Fighting.

Like all war lecturers—and it is about his only point in common with them—Private Peat is asked, "When will the war end?" In his lecture Saturday night at the Pilgrim church he did not pretend to know the answer to this question, but was very emphatic on the opinion that the allies would win it.

He spoke of the early days in 1914-15, when the line was held with raw recruits, mess boys, transport men and cooks, when the odds were ten to one, saying that in those early days we had practically no big guns.

Private Peat is not altogether an orator and unlike all other lecturers, but he has individually and as a strong personality as an actor.

He imitated the sending of the message for more shells, the disappointing reply, and concluded in his own comic way: "But oh, my! We had seen arms and legs of our own boys flying in the air, and we longed so much to see some of the Germans flying around."

He is exceedingly boyish looking, though about 25, is small in stature, and his descriptions of the battles were told in what might have been the style of an enthusiastic schoolboy in giving the details of a great ball game.

He said the fact that he is back with a paralyzed arm and minus his right lung, Private Peat is a cheery, youthful chap, but he does not attempt to disguise the fact that war is hell, a hell from which he has come back physically incapacitated, but morally an exceptionally stimulated man.

WHAT WOMEN WILL NEED WHO GO TO FRENCH FRONT To Provide Home Atmosphere for Soldiers—200 American Women Sent Abroad.

Approximately 200 American women have been sent to France by the Young Men's Christian association to engage actively in the Red Triangle canteen work with Pershing's expeditionary force, according to official announcement just received here.

Three American "W" Women Killed. Recent dispatches from Paris announced the death of three American women canteen workers of the Army and Navy Y. M. C. A., killed during an air raid by the Germans.

What Women Need in France. No woman should go to France to work in the Red Triangle canteen or in any other capacity that takes her out of the chief cities, without being equipped with certain articles indispensable.

The list includes: 2 pairs heavy waterproof boots—or 1 light, and 1 heavy, for a change; 1 pair high artics, 1 pair rubbers, 1 pair bedroom slippers (felt, preferably), 4 pairs woolen stockings, 1 pair bed socks, 3 thick, high-necked, long-sleeved woolen shirts; 2 pairs long woolen drawers, or combination suits; 2 or 3 flannel night gowns or pajamas, or "sleeping-garments" with feet; 1 pair breeches or wool-lined tights, 1 thick sweater, to match blue of suit coat collar; 1 slicker or rain-coat, in addition to Y. M. C. A. cloak or cape; 1 pair heavy gloves, 1 pair leather work gloves, 1 odd skirt to wear under pinafore, blankets and "roll-up" your own big winter coat; for those sleeping in tents, sleeping-bags with feet and ground sheets; 2 pairs dressing gowns or wrapper, 1 small alcohol cooking lamp and solid alcohol, 1 haversack sanitary napkins, 1 hot water bag, 1 thermos bottle, electric torches with batteries (cylindrical shape recommended), 1 small sewing case, bath towels, 1 fountain pen, 1 knife (large with two blades), 1 Tower's tub, extra lenses for those wearing glasses, matches, compact package containing tea, sugar, chocolate, etc.; essential toilet articles, cold cream, soap, etc.
