WOMAN KILLS LIEUTENANT AND COMMITS SUICIDE

Miss Louise Biegert Shoots Lieut. Dickson at Camp Johnston.

Jacksonville, Fla., March 28.—Second Lieutenant Samuel J. Dickson, of Los Angeles, Cal., attached to Camp Joseph E. Johnston, was shot and killed in a room in a hotel here last night. Mrs. Louise Biegert, whom the police said killed the officer, committed suicide by shooting herself, in a room in the hotel a few minutes after she is alleged to have shot Dickson.

Lieut. Dickson was assigned to Camp Johnston on Nov. 21, last. He had recently completed his training here, it was stated.

Mrs. Biegert came here several months ago from Girard, Pa. The police said she left a note in which she gave instruction to notify her brother, Daniel Bender, of Girard.

Mrs. Biegert, who has said to have been about forty years old, had been employed at the base hospital at Camp Johnston. Lieut. Dickson was 25 years old. Although no announcement concerning the affair had been made at Camp Johnston late last night, it was alleged that Dickson had paid Mrs. Biegert some attention.

According to reports made to the police, Mrs. Biegert has a son in training at Camp Meade, Maryland.

ORGANIZING GIRLS OF VALLEY FOR FARM WORK

Miss Elsie Dugger Gets Hearty Response to Her Appeal for War Workers.

(Special to The News.) Pikeville, March 29.—Miss Elsie Dugger, under authority of the division of extension, University of Tennessee, is organizing clubs and generally promoting domestic science work in the counties of the Sequatchie valley. Hearty response is being accorded her efforts everywhere, and in each of the three counties of Marion, Sequatchie and Bledsoe she is ably assisted by resident demonstrators. The county of Marion was organized last week with Miss Kittie McDonald, a Hamilton county girl, as president. This week Sequatchie was organized with Miss Joyce Atkins as president. A large membership was enrolled at Dunlap, whose girls are enthusiastic and untried.

Miss Virginia Branham, demonstrator for Bledsoe county, reports a large club in Pikeville and many other clubs already organized in the rural communities of the county.

In the production and conservation of food the girl farmers of the valley promise great things this year, as one bit of their part in the world's awful struggle.

OLD FEUD BREAKS OUT ANEW IN BLEDSOE

Hugh Price Shoots Bob Swafford at Box Supper—History Written in Blood.

(Special to The News.) Pikeville, March 29.—The old Swafford-Tollett feud, of which the public is quite familiar, was reopened again when Hugh Price shot Bob Swafford at a box supper near here. Swafford attended a box supper on Wednesday night, given by a church, which happened to be located in the enemy's country. Simultaneously, and without warning, a fusillade of bullets came Swafford's way, demonstrating in the old-fashioned way the welcome by which a member of the other side would be received at a church social in the enemy country.

It is said that Price had a brigade, who brought up the rear as the advance was made, and Swafford's retreat was not in good order, nor was it prearranged. Swafford lies seriously wounded at a neighbor's home near the scene of the melée. No arrests have been made and it is intimated that members of the assaulting party will be taken care of in the regular feudal way.

Some twenty years ago the feud which led up to the present episode, began its career of murder and bloodshed, and its history is written in the pages of Bledsoe county's record in letters of blood. In that time it has to its credit fourteen murders and numerous rays in which many were shot and carved. Some are serving terms in the penitentiary, many carry scars as mementoes of former combats and fourteen lie beneath the dew and the sod. In one of the cases which was brought to court for trial, the feeling was so intense and widespread that the trial was moved from Bledsoe to the neighboring county of Rhea and attracted universal attention.

It was hoped that the hand of the feudal spirit, which has menaced the county of Bledsoe for twenty years, had been stayed, as the older participants had shaken hands and made up. This fresh outbreak among the younger set is deeply deplored among the good citizens of Bledsoe county, and it can be said with full truth that no county in the state has a higher grade of law-abiding citizens than Bledsoe, despite its long-standing feud.

LENROOT MAKES STARTLING STATEMENT

Calls Attention to Posters of His Rival and Suggests Liberty May Soon Be Thing of Past.

Sparta, Wis., March 28.—Irvine L. Lenroot, republican candidate for senator, in the course of a speech here yesterday, called attention to the poster displayed by his democratic rival, "Wilson Wants Davies."

"In Germany," said Mr. Lenroot, "the keiser indicates what man he wants sent to the brigades. The man is sent. If President Wilson can do the same thing in the United States soon we won't have any more liberty than they have in Germany."
