MISS BEULAH AMIDON



Beautiful Young Suffragist Who Lectures Here Monday.

Miss Beulah Amidon, suffrage lecturer, will come to Chattanooga next Monday and will speak at the Hotel Patten. She is the youngest, and said to be the most beautiful campaigner in the ranks of the national woman's party.

Miss Amidon has worked actively for suffrage for five years, participating in the state campaign in her native state, North Dakota, in 1914 and in the 1915 campaign in New York.

A graduate of Barnard college, Columbia, in 1915, Miss Amidon began the study of law at the suggestion of her father, who is on the federal bench. But in the midst of her law course, Miss Amidon postponed her legal career to plunge into the radical wing of the American suffrage movement.

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Fire on U. S. Patrol

Shots From Across Rio Grande Fail to Hit American Soldiers.

Marfa, Tex., April 10.—Patrol of American troops was fired upon late yesterday east of Fort Hancock. The firing came from the Mexican side of the Rio Grande, where a large force of armed Mexicans has been concentrating for the past week. No American soldiers were hit when the firing occurred. United States troops are being rushed there from other points along the border. Fort Hancock is seventy-five miles east of El Paso.

OVER MILLION TONS FOOD SHIPPED TO ALLIES IN MARCH

Washington, April 10.—The food administration issues the following: "The total amount of foodstuffs shipped to the allies from the United States and Canada to the allies was about 1,100,000 tons, as against 750,000 tons for the month of February. These materials include, from the United States, about 15,000,000 bushels of wheat and its products; about 16,200,000 bushels of other grains and their products; about 80,000,000 pounds of beef products; and about 200,000,000 pounds of pork products.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE OF U. S. MEETS IN CHICAGO

Chicago, April 10.—More than 3,000 representative business men from all sections of the country gathered at the auditorium today for the sixth annual meeting of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. The sessions were expected to be of more than usual importance because of the war problems taken up and the prominence of the men who are to discuss them.

BOLSHEVIKI CONSENT TO VON MIRBACH AS ENVOY

London, April 10.—The bolshevik government, according to an announcement in the Ivestia, forwarded by Reuters' Petrograd correspondent, has consented to the nomination of Count Von Mirbach, former German minister to Greece, as German ambassador to Russia. Peace negotiations with the Ukraine rada have been opened by the Russian government.

FORMER KENTUCKY JUDGE HANGS HIMSELF TO TREE

Whitesburg, Ky., April 10.—James P. Harris, former county judge of this county, was committed suicide at his home at East Prestonburg. According to the information received, Harris took a rope seventy feet long, tied it around his neck and to the limb of a tree overlooking the Big Sandy river and fell to his death. For several months he had been in failing health.

BAKER URGES RUSHING OF MEN TO AID ALLIES

Convinced America Must Take Large Part in War Earlier Than Expected.

(By Wilbur Forrest.) (New York Tribune Cable Service.) Paris, April 7.—Learn from the highest authority that the paramount thought in the mind of Secretary of War Newton D. Baker on the eve of his return to America is the necessity of rushing American bayonets to France.

Since his return from Italy the secretary has declined all formal engagements or other functions and is spending hours daily at the United States embassy, where he is in constant communication and consultation with American military heads, including Gen. Pershing. His conferences in France, England and Italy, especially since the outbreak of the enemy's desperate attempt to wind up the war, have convinced him of the imperative need of America getting into actual operations with both feet on this side of the Atlantic as quickly as possible.

The secretary's cables to Washington daily emphasize this necessity, and it is certain his own efforts when the returns will be devoted to the speeding up of the transportation of men and war material.

DR. PHILLIPS GOES HOME

Dutch Minister's Health Breaks Under War Strain. (Albert W. Fox, in Washington Post.) Dr. August Phillips, the Dutch minister, who took up his duties here scarcely more than a month ago and has had the "difficult" task of trying to dissuade the United States government from sending Dutch shipping in American ports, has suddenly decided to leave his post for Holland.

His health, accentuated by a nervous breakdown and insomnia, is given as the cause. Dr. Phillips will leave for home within the next few days.

Recent reports from Amsterdam that the Dutch government might recall its minister here as a means of signifying disapproval of the seizure of its shipping naturally caused diplomats to first link Dr. Phillips' departure with the somewhat strained relations between the government of the Netherlands and the government of the United States.

The assumption, however, does not appear to be justified in view of the statements made in official circles here, including the explanation given to the press last night by the Dutch legation.

DR. LOVEJOY TO ADDRESS RED CROSS CONFERENCE
