THREE MILLION ARMY THIS YEAR

America Can Make Only One Answer to Emergency on Western Front.

INCREASE MAN-POWER

Shipbuilding Given Impetus. Transportation Troops Exceeding All Expectations.

By David Lawrence. (Copyright, 1918, by New York Evening Post Company.) Washington, April 19.—There is only one answer to the situation on the western front, so far as America is concerned, and that is an increase in man power.

Such remarkable progress has been made in shipping American troops abroad in the last few weeks that the army naturally has been inclined to what America really could do to get her troops to France if she had twice as many men ready for battle as in the camps and cantonments.

The possibility of building more camps and cantonments throughout the United States during the spring and summer months, while transportation is improving, commends itself, therefore, to the minds of military observers here as worthy of the most serious consideration.

In War Whole Year. American has been in the war a whole year, but her policies here have been shaped on a small scale.

It is conceivable that America may yet take an equal part in the fighting line with the British and French, for no one in a position of responsibility is for one minute considering the possibility of ending the conflict with Germany triumphant.

Secretary Baker is just back from France, enthusiastic and energetic. He was inspired by his trip. He reflects the determination which he found in the British, French and American forces abroad.

That, in a nutshell, is the mistake of the aeroplane situation. In war the policy ought constantly to be, take no chances, but to play safe. Dependence on the French for machine guns and heavy guns worked out without difficulty, so far as these weapons were concerned, but in aeroplane production our allies could unfortunately not meet their own, as well as America's needs.

As for ships, the president without hesitation granted Mr. Hurley's request for the appointment of Charles M. Schwab. The chairman of the shipping board is a rare patriot. He is much more interested in the success of the country than in his own personal welfare, and when he discovered delays in production and found that his own force seemed not to be able to remedy them, he promptly called for men who had made a success of production. He foresaw his own failure and forestalled it.
