HOUSE REFUSES TO RECEDE. WANTS TREASURIES ABOLISHED (Associated Press.) Washington, May 13.—The house today refused to recede from its action in voting to abolish eight United States treasuries and sent back to conference the legislative, judicial and executive appropriation bill, carrying a rider to do away with them. The treasuries are at New Orleans, Boston, Chicago, Cincinnati, New York, Philadelphia, St. Louis and San Francisco.

CHILDLESS WIDOWERS WILL BE DRAFTED Government Machinery Inaugurated for Conscripting in Newfoundland. (Associated Press.) St. Johns, N. F., May 12.—Governmental machinery for the conscription of all able-bodied unmarried men and childless widowers between 15 and 36 years of age was inaugurated today in Newfoundland upon proclamation of Gov. Harris. The conscription measure was signed late Saturday night by the governor. Under the proclamation issued today, eligible for military service are to be called to the colors May 24.

POPULATION OF KIEV MAINTAIN COOL ATTITUDE (Associated Press.) Amsterdam, May 13.—The great mass of the population at Kiev is maintaining a cool attitude toward the new Ukrainian government, with some show of hostility, according to the Berlin Tageblatt. Complete order prevailed here today in the movement of the arrival of three Russian peace delegates at Kiev is announced by the Tageblatt.

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GEN. DASHIELL'S SAY HERE SHORT Will Whip Troops Into Shape, Then Regiments Will Move to Spartanburg.

Camp Forrest and Fort Oglethorpe will not be united under the command of Brig.-Gen. William A. Dashiell, new commander of Camp Forrest. In an interview this morning Gen. Dashiell intimated that his time was being spent in preparing a visiting card, a contingent of recently-selected men, said the general, "and as soon as the men are qualified to take their places with their regiments the brigade will be sent to Camp Wadsworth, S. C."

Just when the departure will take place was not stated, but it is rumored about camp that it will be perhaps within a month. Gen. Dashiell brought only his aide with him from New Orleans—Lieut. Cassius Carter, of the Forty-third Infantry. The general was relieved of command of the Forty-third by Col. W. L. Jordan, who was formerly Gen. Dashiell's aide in the Philippines during the 1901-03 campaign.

Gen. Dashiell spent two terms of two years each in the Philippines during the 1901-03 campaign. He spent two years with the Second Infantry in Honolulu. The commander grew really enthusiastic over his Honolulu reminiscences. "It's a Paradise," he said. "Hawaii never has summer and never has winter. The temperature varies from 65 degrees to 85 degrees. I spent two delightful years in our Pacific post."

This record of foreign service was broken picturesquely by an Indian campaign in 1891. He took part in the Picher campaign, in which Sitting Bull was killed, and in a way, Camp Forrest's present commander helped revenge Gen. John B. Custer, that hero of boyhood. He was in the battle of Wounded Knee in this campaign.

Gen. Dashiell is an expert rifle and pistol shot, but in appearance he suggests a college professor. He is a small man, with a rather pale scholarly face, and he considers a visiting card a matter of the highest importance. He is quite well acquainted with the mountains of East Tennessee, but with the character of recruits which he is working into war shape.

The deceased was 22 years of age and his home was at Ruddlewest, Va.
