PRESIDENT'S DAUGHTER SINGS AT PARK TONIGHT

No Civilians or Women Allowed—No Reserve Seats for Officers.

Monday and Tuesday Miss Margaret Wilson, daughter of the president, will sing to the soldiers at Chickamauga. The occasion is to be emphatically democratic. Her appeal is to the enlisted man, and she has expressed the hope that by singing to the soldiers she may bring some cheer and do her bit towards making the boys who are to do America's fighting happier at their task.

Monday night the singer will give her concert at the Civic Center. Tuesday night she sings at the main Y. M. C. A. just at the end of the new Ogilthorpe car line. On neither occasion will civilians or women be admitted.

No reserve seats are to be put aside for the officers; commissioned men must sit among the enlisted personnel.

During her visit to the park Miss Wilson is to avoid social features as her tour through the states to the military training camps is to sing to the soldiers, she says, and not a social affair.

Miss Wilson comes to Chickamauga from Atlanta, where she sang to the boys at Camp Gordon.

Youngest Graduate of 1917-1918 Central High Class. Has Won Four Gold and One Silver School Medals.

Miss Genevra Proffitt, daughter of Prof. and Mrs. S. Houston Proffitt, has the honor of being the youngest member of the graduating class of Central High this year. And it is further understood that she is the youngest pupil that has ever been graduated from Central.

Miss Proffitt is only 15, having celebrated her birthday last month. Graduating came easy to her as she has always been a careful student, and because of her high marks in her classes, was relieved from having to take examination. She has been on the honor roll of Central High throughout the present school year, and has made no grade lower than A.

When she was a sophomore in the Sale Creek High school she represented the school in the Hamilton county inter-high school oratorical contest and won the girls' medal. She holds four gold medals and one silver medal, won during her past school days. As a little girl 3 years old she could read, and entered school when she was four and a half years old. During her entire school life she has never been tardy at school, and has only missed two days, her absence then having been due to sickness. She has always led her classes, and won the Springfield medal during her first year in the Sale Creek school, when she was her twelfth year.

Miss Genevra is the second daughter of Prof. and Mrs. Proffitt, and will enter some college or university next term.

REPORT OF WAR WORK GIVEN BY DAUGHTERS

Returned U. D. C. Delegates Pay Glowing Tribute to the Nashville Convention.

Patriotism and service were the keynote of the state convention of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, which closed at the end of the week in Nashville, according to report of returned delegates.

Miss Sarah Ruth Frazier, president of the Gen. A. P. Stewart chapter; Mrs. Charles R. Hyde, historian-general; Mrs. I. D. Strong, president of the Frances M. Walker chapter; Mrs. Belle Spencer and other delegates from Chattanooga organizations were in attendance during the week.

In keeping with the patriotic motif, a social entertainment was marked by simplicity and elegance. Nashville ladies extended a most cordial hospitality, and the several parties planned were successfully given, together with other forms of entertainment, but all being in keeping with the patriotic spirit. Mrs. Birdie Owen, the state president, conducted the sessions with consummate grace, and an unchallenged fairness, it is reported.

Chattanoogaans were especially interested in the report of Mrs. E. O. Wells, of Rockwood, a former resident here, concerning a wide range of war work as state chairman. Local war work, under the chairmanship of Mrs. John Fouché, incorporated in Miss Sarah Frazier's report, was the occasion of congratulations, as was also that of the Frances M. Walker chapter, which in view of a small membership, seemed to place it in the lead among all chapters in point of achievement.

Following the making of a complete roster of the descendants of Confederate veterans who have entered army service, it was noted that nearly all chapter flags bore signs of wear upon the ground work in the honor stars of soldier boys in France. On one of the flags of the Nashville chapter, the letters "U. D. C." were formed entirely of the stars. Interest centered chiefly, however, in report of work being done in France, and the endowment of hospital beds bearing the nameplates of Gen. N. B. Forrest, Gen. Felix Zollicoffer, Gen. William Bate and privates of the Confederacy. The cost of maintenance is \$600 a year.

The general organization has three full wards with ten beds each. Tennessee has four of these beds. Historic interest carried much local interest, in that "War Days and War Ways," one of the addresses, was given by Mrs. Charles R. Hyde, of this city, historian-general. A feature of the evening was the motion, made by Miss Susie Gearty, that the name of Commodore Matthew Fountaine Maury be presented to the general convention this fall for placing in the hall of fame. Mrs. Hyde was appointed to present the name.

Women Subscribe Liberally

Liberty Drive Shows Women Bought \$52,000 Worth of Bonds.

Doing their "bit" in war work is all that some women believe in doing, but the women of Morgan county believe in doing their "share."

In the recent liberty loan campaign the women of the county alone subscribed \$52,000, the total being nearly \$75,000. The proportion for this county, according to government figures, was only \$15,500, but the men and women of this community thought the amount entirely too small.

Figuring the amount to a minimum, this allows \$4.88 per capita, or \$24 per family.
