SOLDIERS AND SAILORS TO BE GIVEN SPECIAL RATES

These on Furlough at Own Expense to Be Charged About a Cent a Mile for Transportation.

Washington, May 25.—Soldiers and sailors on furlough and traveling at their own expense will be given special passenger rates of about a cent a mile under an order issued by Director-General McAdoo.

The plan, arranged to make it easier for soldiers and sailors to visit their homes before going overseas, has been proposed by a resolution pending in congress.

The dairy industry in and around the Chattanooga community is becoming more and more efficient every day from both a practical and a sanitary standpoint.

A few years ago, or perhaps not so far back as that, the average housewife buying milk from a dairy in this district was satisfied to obtain it direct from the country.

cerning the sanitary conditions of the dairy: They will not have just any milk supply the dairymen may choose.

Crude Equipment. A large part of the milk supply coming into Chattanooga from the surrounding dairy farms has been coming from small places where the conditions were far from up to the standard required by the health authorities.

Much Improvement. By continued inspection and hard work the inspectors have succeeded in bringing about a marked improvement. However, Dr. Knight states that the dairies are yet far from being perfect.

Problems of Sewerage. Dr. Knight stated that up to date approximately 2,000 rural homes have been given a safe method for sewage disposal and practically the entire private water supply has been investigated and efforts are being made to put these in a purified condition.

White Suits for Dairymen. While it is not imperative that all of the milkmen wear white uniforms and caps when milking, the authorities are requiring all milking to be done by men in clean apparel.

Dr. E. G. Carter, of the United States public health service, has been inspecting the dairies during the past several months and Dr. A. R. Gwynny, assistant to Dr. Knight, has been making a medical examination of the dairymen, giving them the typhoid inoculation.

The milk inspection for the city has been in charge of Dr. Stanton Barrett, director of laboratories and dairy inspection. Dr. Barrett's milk report for the past month shows that forty-three examinations have been made; fifty-two dairies and pasteurization plants inspected; a total of 276 for the temperature of milk as sold on wagons.

The city ordinance reads that milk having more than 200,000 bacteria count shall be regarded as insanitary.
