MUNITION DUMP BLOWN UP BY U. S. ARTILLERY

Several Direct Hits Cause
Dump to Burst Into Flames
and Then Explode.

With the American Army in France, May 30.—(6:30 p.m.)—American artillerymen have blown up a large enemy ammunition dump north of Commercy. Several direct hits were made. The dump first burst into flames and then exploded with a blast that could be heard for miles around.

ADVOCATE LAITY RIGHTS FOR WOMEN

Knoxville, May 31.—Laity rights for women of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, was advocated in a resolution adopted at the annual convention of the Knoxville district. This question was presented at the recent general assembly meeting at Atlanta, and first adopted but later vetoed by the college of bishops on the grounds that it should be ratified by the different annual conferences.

TWO KNOXVILLE BANKS HAVE CONSOLIDATED

Knoxville, May 31.—The City National bank and the Knoxville Savings bank of Knoxville have consolidated. In the consolidation the capitalization is \$500,000 and the surplus and undivided profits \$250,000. The deposits of the two institutions aggregate more than \$5,000,000, and the total resources exceed \$6,500,000.

KNOXVILLE SUFFERS FROM WATER SHORTAGE

OHIO NATIONAL GUARD IS CONFINED TO CAMPS

Not for Misconduct of Men, but on
Account of Intense Training
and Quarantine.

Petersburg, Va., May 31.—Publication of the order at Camp Lee confining to camp indefinitely the Thirty-seventh division, Ohio national guard, with references to a camp bulletin warning soldiers against accosting women on the streets and hailing automobiles, caused Adj. Gen. Wood, of Ohio, to seek an explanation from Maj.-Gen. Farnsworth, commanding the post. Later Gen. Wood telegraphed Gov. Cox, of Ohio, that the order was not issued on account of misconduct of the men, but on account of intense training and quarantine.

DECLARES THE NAVY IS DOING NOBLE WORK

In Keeping Open Road to France for
the Hundreds of Thousands of
Americans Already There.

Wilkes Barre, Pa., May 31.—Declaring that the navy is doing noble work in keeping open the road to France for the hundreds of thousands of American soldiers already there, Secretary Daniels, in an impromptu address here, declared that troop movement will reach the million mark in a few weeks, that in a few months the two million mark will have been reached and that ten million or more men will be sent if need be to win the war.

Secretary Daniels' speech was unexpected as he stopped here only for breakfast while en route to Scranton. He was informed that the G. A. R. was holding ceremonies in honor of sailors who fell in the Civil war and was quick to respond to an invitation to speak.

The secretary expressed confidence in the navy's ability to win the submarine evil. "We are delivering destroyers by the hundreds and we will build them by the hundreds," he declared. "We will equip them with able men such as you have sent from Wilkes Barre until it will not be possible for a submarine to exist in the ocean. In this war the navy's business has been to hunt submarines. We have hunted them and will continue to hunt them until they shall not dare to appear as assassins of the sea."

MORE AMERICAN TROOPS SENT IN MAY THAN THIS FEBRUARY

Easton, Pa., May 31.—In a speech here accosting a jeweled sword, presented to him by the people of Easton, his birthplace, Gen. Peyton C. March, chief of staff of the United States armies, declared more American troops were taken to Europe in May than were there when he left in February. No figures were given. Other accomplishments of the war department were described by Gen. March. The sword was presented by Easton "in token of its esteem for America's distinguished soldier." The presentation was made by Mayor Nevin.

MISS STINSON'S AIRPLANE OVERTURNS THIRD TIME

Binhamton, N. Y., May 31.—Miss Katherine Stinson's airplane overturned for the third time within a week yesterday when she attempted to make a start for New York. The machine was damaged but she again escaped injury. When rescuers reached her she was sitting strapped to the seat with her head a few inches from the ground.

FINDS PREHISTORIC BONES ON FARM IN OKLAHOMA

Gulfton, Okla.—While W. E. Dunspey, a farmer living near here, was ploughing in his field he struck something hard with the plow share. After digging for some time he uncovered what was said to be the bones of a mastodon in a very good state of preservation. He found almost enough bones to make a complete skeleton. They have been turned over to the state university.

SPEED IN TRANSPORTATION AIM OF PRESIDENT MARKHAM

Philadelphia, May 31.—Speed in transportation will be the aim of Charles H. Markham, former president of the Illinois Central railroad, in his new duties as regional director of railroads for the Philadelphia district. Mr. Markham arrived here today and established himself at the general offices of the Pennsylvania railroad, preparatory to beginning his duties on Saturday. Mr. Markham said that in his efforts to speed up

traffic, he did not propose to interfere with the practical operation of the various railroads under his jurisdiction.

"I have no intention," Mr. Markham said, "of insisting that a certain car be moved from a certain yard when it might require the shifting of scores of other cars to effect the movement. What is being planned is a broad scheme of co-operation that will bring about a faster movement of cars everywhere."

THERE WERE GROUNDS FOR REPORTS OF SUBMARINES

An Atlantic Port, May 31.—Recent reports that German submarines have been lurking in southern waters off the American coast were given support today with the arrival here of a Brazilian steamship. The passengers said that last Saturday when the ship was entering the Gulf stream off the Florida coast, a wireless warning to look for submarines was received and that the captain immediately changed his course, and made a very wide detour before heading again for this port.

Sir Leslie Probyn, one of the passengers, former British governor-general of the Barbados, who is on his way to take the new post of governor-general of Jamaica, said that before leaving the Barbados, he had heard a German submarine had been sighted May 16, near Bermuda. One report to this effect was made by an American vessel and another by a British vessel, he said.

OBSERVES 108TH BIRTHDAY BY EATING CANDY IN BED

Springfield, Ill.—Mrs. Antoinette Smith celebrated her 108th birthday here by eating candy while invalided in bed. Her usual meal, aged 80, is her only worry, she says. "Auntie" Smith was born in the Madeira Islands in 1812. She has four other children and a great, great, grandchild living.

CHECKROOM TIPS MAY SOON GO TO RED CROSS FUNDS

Cleveland, O.—A new method of raising hundreds of thousands of dollars annually for the Red Cross and other worthy war causes has been advanced here. It is suggested that Red Cross girls be placed in charge of hat and coat checking rooms at hotels and other places where such privileges net thousands of dollars annually. It is pointed out that the continual seeking of tips and charges in such places is annoying, but that no one would feel that way about a Red Cross representative and would be more than apt to give generously. Whether the suggestion will be followed up is not yet known, but influential persons here are said to be strongly in favor of the plan.
