

MUST HUNT JOBS OR GET IN ARMY

Work or Fight Order Creates Little Stir in Affected Circles.

SOME GET OUT AND HUSTLE

While Others Just Sit Still and Wait for Something to Turn Up.

The "work or fight" rule, which goes into effect today, created but little stir in affected circles.

At the other end of the line, Miller Bros. have lost four men and six others will soon go, although they did not rush off exactly on the 1st.

Other men in draft age are swinging on to present jobs, although they are within the rule, simply waiting to see what will turn up.

Expect Government to Find Jobs. Strange to say, a number of men in the draft age and who are affected by the rule are under the impression that the government will obtain them positions in exchange for their present employment.

Government aid may be invoked to obtain these productive jobs by applying at the government labor recruiting station on Broad street, but the government is by no means in the position of having to help these unproductive men get jobs in order to avoid taking them into the army.

In speaking of the work or fight rule, Foster V. Brown, chairman of city board No. 1, said the government would not act harshly toward men who had not as yet changed jobs, provided they were attempting to change in good faith.

A large number of applications for labor are now going through the federal labor employment bureau, urged on by the "work or fight" rule. In this rush it is extraordinary the number of men who enroll themselves as chauffeurs.


YOUNG LADY COMES TO LIUET. CLARK'S HOME
