

ONE CANNOT SERVE TWO MASTERS AT ONCE

Plan Proposed to Divorce Commercial Telegraphers' Union From Western Union.

(International News Service.) Chicago, July 11.—Telegraphers' delegates whose expenses were paid by Newcomb Carlton, president of the Western Union Telegraph company, meeting here, have taken initial steps toward the organization of a "company union" of telegraphers, which, according to B. E. Black, of St. Louis, temporary chairman, will be totally divorced from the Commercial Telegraphers' union.

LIST WRECK VICTIMS INCREASED TO NINETY

Kingston Springs Negro Dies at Nashville Hospital—Others Will Not Live.

(Associated Press.) Nashville, July 11.—The fatality list resulting from the collision Tuesday on the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis railway near Nashville, was swelled this morning by the death in a hospital of Wm. Luker, Kingston Springs, Tenn., negro, making the total 90. Elvin Kennedy, mail clerk of Nashville, is at death's door and J. W. Smith, Abilene, Texas, is in a critical condition.

POLITICAL CHIEFTAINS FORCED LOSS OF VICTORY

How Rumanians Could Have Pocketed German and Bulgarian Armies in Dobrudja and Changed Whole Course of War, Yet Failed To Do So, Leaks Out.

London, June 30.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—How the Rumanian armies lost an opportunity of annihilating the German and Bulgarian armies in the Dobrudja in 1916 is revealed in a confidential document which has just reached the Associated Press from an authoritative source in Russia. The document contains an account of a conversation between Field Marshal Von Mackensen and the Rumanian military leaders which occurred shortly after the Rumanian peace treaties were signed.

"PERSHING'S FIFTY" LEAVING FOR FRANCE—MISSION "OVER HERE" ENDS

Happy-Go-Lucky, Enthusiastic Veterans Who Helped in Liberty Loan and Red Cross Drives Return to Battle Front With New Spirit.

They were selected two months ago from the men who had seen service in the Toul sector and came to help in the Liberty Loan and Red Cross campaigns. They have been touring the United States. Altogether, the fifty of them have covered all the important cities and many towns throughout the country.

KORNLOFF WILLING TO RECOGNIZE SOVIETS

Provided a Campaign Is Organized Against Germany With Help of Allies.

(International News Service.) London, July 11.—Gen. Kornloff, former commander of the Russian Cossacks, has issued a proclamation stating that he is willing to recognize the soviets' control of the Russian army if a campaign is organized against Germany through the negotiation of the allies' help, said an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Moscow today.

GERMAN ADMIRALTY INSISTED ON ATTACK

On Allied Naval Forces—Resulted in Loss of Two Austrian Dreadnoughts.

(Associated Press.) Italian Army Headquarters, Wednesday, July 10.—Insistence by the German admiralty upon an Austrian naval expedition for the destruction of the nets in the straits of Otranto at the entrance to the Adriatic and for an attack on the allied naval forces was responsible for the departure from Pola of the two Austrian dreadnoughts which were torpedoed by the Italians in the Adriatic on July 10, according to information gleaned from prisoners taken by the Italians in the recent fighting.

73,000 FINNS UNDER ARREST OF GERMANS

Minority Socialist Leader Criticizes System Being Imposed in Subdued Provinces.

(Associated Press.) Amsterdam, July 11.—Since the Germans entered Finland, 73,000 workmen there have been arrested, and many of them have been executed, declared Hugo Haas, leader of the minority socialists, in a recent speech in the reichstag, according to a verbatim report published by the Hetvolk. The deputy also criticized German rule in Livonia and Esthonia.

GRADUATE OF OGLETHORPE CAMP KILLED IN FRANCE

Greensboro, N. C., July 11.—J. W. Paisley, of Guilford county, has received word from the adjutant-general's office in Washington that his son, First Lieutenant John C. Paisley, had been killed in action in France, in June.

BELGIAN KING AND QUEEN FLY OVER ENGLISH CHANNEL

London, July 11.—A royal air escort of three Belgian seaplanes guarded King Albert and Queen Elizabeth on their flight over the channel from Belgium to England Saturday morning on a trip which marked the first time that any ruler has ever made an air flight from one country to another.


AUSTRIAN RESERVE FORCE REPULSED ENEMY—VIENNA

FIFTY GIRLS KILLED, ENEMY BOMBS AMBULANCE PARK

London, July 11.—(British Wireless Service.)—In a recent German raid on the Belgians, more than fifty girls were killed by air bombs launched upon an ambulance park at La Panne, behind the Yser front. According to a special dispatch from The Hague, fifty bombs were dropped in the immediate neighborhood of the park, and several struck a large villa about a hundred yards from the hospital.


