NEGRO SELECTMEN GET ROUSING FAREWELL

Market Street Jammed With Cheering Spectators—\$350 Thrown in Flag.

With much cheering and promises of what they intended doing to the selectmen, 355 negro selectmen marched down Market street yesterday afternoon about 5:20 en route to the Terminal station, where they entrained for Camp Sherman, Chillicothe, O. The parade, which was scheduled to start at 4, was about thirty minutes late, but this only served to increase the crowds on Market street, and by the time the selectmen reached Eighth street only a narrow lane was left for them through which to march.

A feature of the parade which met an unprecedented success was a large flag carried by four Khorassans, in front of which was a banner which read, "Throw your spare change on Old Glory for the boys." The eager onlookers, white and colored, kept the flag busy from the time it reached Market at Sixth street until it arrived at the Terminal station. The money, which was practically all silver, amounted to approximately \$350—almost a dollar for each man.

A motor lorry, in charge of two members of El Kedan temple and piled high with bags and suitcases, had the right-of-way down Market street a few minutes before the first of the parade arrived in sight, but it was seen that not much more than half of the selectmen were thus taken care of, as a large number of them carried handbags or suitcases.

Cheering and comments by the crowd caused the majority of the selectmen to indulge in a continuous line of boasting all the way to the station. With grins which caused the onlookers to grin also, a running fire of comment was handled along much in this manner: "Say, is you got your razor, Jerry?" "You bet I has, and de kaiser shore am gwine to feel it if I gets the chance"—and, "Boys, you

THOMAS B. WHITE NOW IN ESSENTIAL WORK

Will Not Lose Deferred Classification Under Work or Fight Ruling.

In publishing the reclassified list of county board No. 2 a few days ago it was stated that Thomas B. White was placed in class 1 through his non-appearance to defend his case under the "work or fight" rule.

At the station the congestion which was experienced the last time the negro selectmen left was eliminated. The Khorassans, with the assistance of the police, formed a lane through which the selectmen passed, and in this way the eager crowds were kept off. When the last selectman had passed through and was seated in his particular car the relatives and friends were admitted and the aisles between the tracks were packed and jammed with a struggling, seething mass of humanity.

The Knights of Khorassan, while very proud of the magnificent demonstration in honor of the departing 355 colored selectmen, feel that this could not have been so complete a success without the hearty co-operation of the other organizations to which due credit should be given.

The Boy Scouts, under the direction of Scoutmaster Roy D. Bachman, rendered excellent service. The little fellows went ahead of the parade distributing cards which read, "Take off your hat when the flag goes by, and throw your spare change on old glory for the boys." This stunt, in charge of Khorassan L. E. Rowland and eight members of El Kedan Temple, was highly successful. Before leaving the hall on Walnut street, members of the Khorassans pinned a fringe of dollar bills completely around the edge of the flag, with silver dollars in the middle, and the flag was almost dragging the pavement with donations by the time the terminal station was reached.

The Elks, Shlone, Kiwanis and the Allied Trades unions placed cheering squads along Market street from Sixth street to the terminal station, keeping up continual enthusiasm along the entire line of march.

Two negro organizations, the Knights Templar and Knights of Pythias, participated in the parade. Neither of these organizations recognize a colored branch, but when the negroes appeared at the courthouse in full regalia, carrying the American flag and overrunning with enthusiasm, the Knights of Khorassan allowed them to participate.

Camp Greenleaf band was unable to come, and the Khorassans secured instead the Eleventh Cavalry band, which was met by a committee at Seventh street and escorted to the hall on Walnut street, where supper was served them before the parade.

The members of the baggage committee, W. P. Means, H. P. Bohr and J. A. Horton, were highly complimented by Foster V. Brown and Gen. Matt Whitaker, in charge of the selectmen. Gen. Whitaker said, "It's the best job of handling baggage I have ever seen." The committee was very tired, but very happy when they had finished the big job of moving the baggage for the 355 selectmen. Trucks for handling the baggage were donated by the Crabtree Transfer company.

Chas. E. Watson was grand marshal at the parade. Emil Wassman, recently drafted by the government to handle patriotic demonstrations in honor of departing selectmen, marched at the head of the column.

The second section was headed by El Kedan Drum and Bugle corps. About 250 Knights of Khorassan, each man carrying an American flag and wearing a fez, made a fine showing.



LETTER RECEIVED FROM BOY REPORTED KILLED

W. L. Barton Wrote of Wounds. Father Cables in Hope Death Report Was False.

A letter just received by Miss Grace Cornish from William Leonard Barton, young Chattanooga marine, who was mentioned in a recent casualty list as having died, from wounds received while in action, brought a ray of hope that Leonard still lives.

He was wounded on June 9, and his letter to Miss Cornish was written a few days later. He reported that he was in the best hospital in France, and was being cared for by a real American nurse.

In regard to his wounds, he said he was doing as well as could be expected. "An pretty well worked out, but still kicking," he wrote. "I got in the way of eight pieces of shrapnel and it did some the worse for the contact. But, as my head did not stop any of it, it did not do anything more than fracture by shoulder and knocked several other holes in me, ranging from the bottom of my left foot to my head. I happened to be close to a first aid dressing station and did not lose much blood."

He jokingly explained that rifle and machine gun bullets were not big enough for him, and the enemy had to send over a shell of about forty inches to get him. "I think I'll get out of here, and fill my part of the Christmas contract," he said. "I had reference to his coming home at that time."

He complimented the work Red Cross nurses are doing. "Lots of the people in the states," he related, "think the Red Cross nurses have a good time over here, but if they could see how hard they have to work they would soon change their minds. One nurse has to attend to from five to twelve patients twelve hours a day. I was wounded on June 9, and haven't been out of bed since. I don't know how long it will be before I get out."

He called attention to newspaper accounts of what the marines have been and are doing, and said he was going to receive the Croix de Guerre, the French medal of honor for bravery.

W. A. Barton, father of the gallant young marine, has cabled in an effort to get some information regarding his son. He has been loathe to believe that his boy is dead.

William Leonard Barton was a member of the 80th company, 6th regiment, United States marines.

MAY FILL VACANCIES WITH 1918 CLASS MEN

Twenty-two white men, physically qualified for general military service, have been called from county board No. 2, J. B. Sizer, chairman. These men will be entrained for Camp Shelby, Hattiesburg, Miss., during a period of five days between Aug. 5 and Aug. 9.

Registrants of the June 5, 1918, class may be involuntarily inducted, provided all class 1 men of 1917 have been exhausted. The men must be drafted with the least disturbance possible to agricultural conditions.
