





### SOVIET COLLAPSE COMING QUICKLY

#### Allies' March Through Siberia and Growing Revolt of Workers End Hope of Bolsheviks.

(By Arno Dorsch-Fleutot.) Stockholm, via London, Sept. 12.—(Copyright, N. Y. World.)—The fall of the bolshevik power evidently is coming quicker than seemed probable when I left Russia ten days ago. There are two significant symptoms.

The first symptom is the rapid advance of the allied rescue party marching to join the Czech-Slovaks through the Baikal region to Irkutsk. The only hope of the bolsheviks in Siberia was to hold the mountainous Khatanga region. The second symptom is the failure of the red terror at Nizhni-Novgorod to repress the peasants and workmen, who have been in a state of growing revolt for six weeks.

The arrest of the 400 bourgeois and other anti-bolshevik Easts among the workmen and peasant leaders by the Nizhni-Novgorod commissar is proof of the bolshevik inability to stem the movement.

I have precise information from Nizhni-Novgorod bearing upon the present situation. Nizhni-Novgorod has been surrounded by bolshevik troops with artillery and machine-guns trained on the surrounding factories for more than a month. Nevertheless the workmen and the peasants have been able to hold immense mass meetings at which the bolsheviks have been denounced.

The movement is so great that it has spread even into the government of Kazan. Now six districts around Kazan are reported as affected.

As this whole region is contiguous to the Volga territory, which is held and is being reorganized economically by the assembly government sitting at Samara, it means that Nizhni-Novgorod is about to join Kazan in the Samara movement. The loss of Nizhni-Novgorod to the bolsheviks is thus inevitably hastened by the present warfare.

My information regarding this crucial district of Russia came from a social revolutionist of the Spirdovna party, who was imprisoned in Nizhni-Novgorod, but was released a fortnight ago. I saw him just before leaving Russia. He said that Nizhni-Novgorod affords an example which proves Maria Spiridovna's statement that the bolsheviks have with them now only

### TWO GERMAN AIR RAIDS ON PARIS

#### Several Squadrons Take Part, Dropping Bombs and Doing Some Property Damage.

Paris, Sept. 15.—Two German air raids were made against Paris early today. Several squadrons of German planes took part in the first attack, which lasted from 1:30 until 3 o'clock. Bombs were dropped and there were some victims as well as damage to property.

The raiders were greeted by an unusually intense barrage fire from the high angle guns defending the city.

The alarm for the second raid was sounded at 4:30. The anti-aircraft guns again put up a brisk fire, lasting a quarter of an hour. Up to 5:20 no details had been announced about the second raid.

### PATTULLO NOT IN OPTIMISTIC MOOD

#### War Correspondent Tells Some Interesting Personal Experiences on War Front.

Dallas, Tex., Sept. 15.—George Pattullo, war correspondent, has just arrived at his home here from France. He will return to the battle front within the next few weeks, he said. He has been in France almost constantly since shortly after the United States entered the war.

"I do not take the optimistic view that many do that the war is about over. There is still much hard fighting for the allies to do, and the public should not let enthusiasm get the upper end of them. The Germans are being whipped, and they are falling back slowly. So far the British and the French have stood the brunt of the fighting, but there is much more to do and the Americans are going to do their share.

"You find Texas over there most any place you go, and they can be depended on to be in the midst of the fighting.

"I met one Texan, whose name I won't mention in a peculiar way. I was being shown the British front by some British officers and they told me they had a Texan with them, a man who said he came from Dallas. I asked to be directed to him, thinking possibly I might know the fellow or take up an acquaintance with him. He was with the British artillery and was a fairly good shot. He had disobeyed orders and been sent to the gunnery school.

"Newspaper men and other writers are well treated over there. There are not so many of them, and the censorship is very strict. We are not permitted to go any place unless accompanied by an officer and our copy was cut until it was almost impossible to write stories. But all that was changed when we went to the American front. We wore the regulation uniform with a 'C' on our sleeve, indicating that we were correspondents. We were permitted to visit the front line trenches and come and go as we pleased. The censorship was less strict and our 'stuff' went out in good shape.

"All that the American censors asked was that you show them all your copy and that you show them the papers and go to the front from day to day in automobiles. Some go into the front trenches to get their stories and get color for their articles. There are about a dozen writers with the American forces, that is, accredited writers. Of course some of the free lance writers are always coming and going.

"I don't believe that there is any one over there who really enjoys being in the front line trenches. They don't like them, but someone when they get out they want to get back. There is something fascinating about the roar of the big guns that draws men into the trenches. When you get away you are dissatisfied until you get back. I've been away for a month and want to get back over there right now.

### WAR INSURANCE CAUSE FOR INQUIRY

#### Soldiers Must Sign Blanks to Secure Allotments for Their Dependents.

Washington, Sept. 15.—The war risk insurance bureau, under what its officials claim is a change in policy, has discontinued all allotments in cases where the soldiers have not claimed an allowance. As a result of the confusion and misunderstanding 300,000 allotments have been stopped. So far as the great number of cases is concerned, it is not a serious matter, but it is a matter that should be corrected. The soldiers must sign a blank so that their dependents, whether wife, parent or child, can claim the allowance. This has resulted in a delay of several weeks in the payments. The compulsory allotment dates from the time it is actually delivered instead of from the time the claim is filed, and that is another handicap for soldiers' dependents.

On account of these hitches and delays congressmen from all sections of the country are receiving numerous letters urging them to ascertain what the trouble is. As there are so many soldiers in the front, congressmen are being urged to investigate the matter. Representative Huddleston especially has received a great many inquiries on the subject, and he has therefore made special visits to the bureaus to urge the officials to straighten out matters.

In a speech at the house this afternoon Mr. Huddleston discussed the question, and many of his fellow legislators made inquiries as to the result of his conference with officials of the bureau. They expressed surprise that any official act passed by congress was amended.
