WHY U-BOATS RAIDED
Bernhard Says German People Were
Deceived.
Copenhagen, Oct. 9.—(Wednesday.)—
George Bernhard, writing in the Berlin
Vossische Zeitung, says that the subma-
rine warfare never have been pro-
claimed if the German people had not
been deceived and misled. Discussing
the peace steps taken at Washington in
1916 and 1917, the writer says:
" If we had known that President Wil-
son had been continually requested to act
as peace mediator, and even that speci-
fied conditions had been submitted, our
action would have been different. Had
we known that at the moment unrestrict-
ed submarine warfare was declared Pres-
ident Wilson had agreed to accept the
role of mediator, the German people, in
the great majority, would never have tol-
erated a policy which brought upon them
the reputation of being double-tongued.
All this, explains Bernhard, goes far
toward making President Wilson's sharp
words understandable.
" It also explains Ambassador Gerard's
unreserved speech, when one recalls
that the German government permitted
him to make a friendly address in the
presence of high officials at the very mo-
ment when the submarine campaign was
already decided upon," he concludes.

DAILY HEALTH TALKS
What Is the Cause of
Backache?
BY DOCTOR CORNELL
Backache is perhaps the most com-
mon ailment from which women suf-
fer. Rarely do you find anybody free
from it. Sometimes the cause is ob-
scure, but Dr. Pierce, of Buffalo, N. Y.,
a high medical authority, says the
cause is very often a form of catarrh
that settles in the delicate membrane
of the feminine organs. When these
organs are inflamed, the first symp-
tom is backache, accompanied by
bearing-down sensations, weakness,
