WAR'S EFFECT UPON RELIGIOUS CONDITIONS THE WORLD AROUND. Victories in Bible Lands Have Larger Meaning for Church People—Pulpits and Sunday Schools Echo the Significance of Conquests in Canaan.

(By William T. Ellis, the Religious Rambler.) One day's victory in France is eclipsed by the on-rushing victories of the days that follow, but conquests in Canaan remain remembered, and are considered and commented upon in pulpits and press and class an conference. Gen. Allenby's spectacular sweep in Palestine is one of the greatest achievements of the war, not only in a military sense, but also because it is carrying a message of propaganda into the remotest church and Sunday school in the world. The potency of religious agencies in shaping opinion is often ignored or misunderstood. It is a fact that this single triumph of Gen. Allenby has been the means of starting a world-wide discussion in church circles of the larger and loftier aims of the allied cause that is of incalculable influence at the present time in strengthening the sentiment of the people. There are more persons interested in religion than in any other subject. Sports and stocks and the drama and politics may get more attention from the daily newspaper; but any comprehensive test shows that the timeless virtues of the spiritual realm still exist. Religion is the great power that holds the affection and loyalty of a larger number of human beings than any other portion of the globe's surface. It is "the Holy Land."

Breaking the Sway of Centuries. For more than a thousand years—lacking less than a century, during which the Christian era was a large part of it—Palestine proper, and the adjacent Bible lands, have been under the sway of Moslem, who has usually been a tyrannical and intolerant master to his Christian subjects. Throughout these long centuries the Hebrew broken cry has continually gone up to heaven from the oppressed peoples, "How long, O Lord, how long!" All manner of injustices and cruelties have been visited upon Christians whose lot lay in the land called "Holy." Within the past three years, more than a million wearers of the name of Jesus have been fleshly done to death in the regions where once He walked. Now, dramatically, the Christian holds the affection and loyalty of a larger number of human beings than any other portion of the globe's surface. It is "the Holy Land."

What prophets have pictured and preachers and patriots have prayed for, is now assured. The prayer of these long centuries, the Hebrew captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised." So far as Palestine is concerned, that message first spoken in Nazareth has now found fulfillment. There is no spot, not even Belgium itself, where the moral aims of the war have found fuller and more spectacular fulfillment than in the Holy Land.
