MESSAGE TO CLEAR UP SOME OBSCURE POINTS. PRESIDENT WILL EXPLAIN HIS PROGRAM. League of Nations Important Question of Peace Conference.

Washington, Nov. 21. - (I. N. S.) - Complete arrangements for President Wilson's trip abroad are ready for announcement. All details have been fixed and the official program now is before him for his approval. He will leave Washington about Dec. 4 and go directly to New York, where the big liner Agamemnon, formerly the Kaiser Wilhelm II, will be waiting for him. This big vessel has been newly fitted up for the trip, her interior furnishings, removed when the steamer was diverted to transport work, having been reinstalled. It is said here that the complete program for the president's movements will be announced at the same time that the personnel of the American delegation to the peace conference is made public. The president, on the trip, will occupy the imperial suite on the Agamemnon, which was originally fitted up for the former German emperor.

President's Message. Meanwhile officials expect that the president's message to be delivered at the opening of the short session of congress will clear up some of the obscure questions involved in his trip abroad. Congress will meet on Dec. 2, but it is not expected that the president will address it until Dec. 3 at noon. He has not yet begun work on his address, so it is unlikely that it will be available until he actually commences to speak.

League of Nations. In connection with the president's trip, officials at the peace conference today said that one of his most important utterances on the subject of the question of a league of nations, the biggest task before the peace conference, seems to have been overlooked. This was his first announcement of his belief in the necessity for such a league made at the first annual assemblage of the league to enforce peace, on May 27, 1916. His statements made at that time are extremely significant in view of the admission that it is because of opposition to the league plan that he has found it necessary to make the trip across.

Right of People. After reviewing the reason why every people should have a right to choose the sovereignty under which they shall live, that small states had the right to have their sovereignty respected and that the world has a right to be free from every disturbance of its peace that has its origin in aggression and disregard of the rights of people and nation, the president said: "I sincerely do believe in the things that I am sure that I speak the mind and wish of the people of America when I say that the United States is willing to become a partner in a feasible association of nations formed in order to realize these objects and make them secure against violation. There is nothing that the United States would prefer to itself that any other nation has. We are willing, on the contrary, to limit ourselves along with them to a prescribed course of duty and respect for the rights of others which will check any selfish passion of our own, as it will check any aggressive impulse of theirs."

Reasons for Going. Officials declared today that this declaration is fully significant today as it was when it was first delivered. It embodies the reason why the president is going to Europe at this time, they say, and he will personally explain away opposition in certain quarters that has seemed to threaten shipwreck of the plan.

BUSINESS BLOCK BURNED. Little Alabama City of Attalla Visited by \$30,000 Fire. Gadsden, Ala., Nov. 21. - (Special.) - Fire destroyed a business block in Attalla last night entailing a loss of \$30,000. Among the buildings burned were Altus theater and equipment, loss \$5,500; with \$2,500 insurance, building owned by L. Walker, of Birmingham; Hudson-Blisden Clothing store, loss \$10,000, insurance \$3,000; building owned by Joe Rhea, insurance \$5,000; and the Alabama Power company's office, loss \$7,000, building owned by Mrs. Eula Davis, of New York, insurance \$3,000. The Red Cross chapter occupied the second floor of the Rhea building and lost a lot of supplies. Boyd Arnold was seriously burned by a live electric wire. Walker's drugstore and the Merchants and Farmers' bank were damaged by water. The timely response of the Gadsden fire department saved a number of other buildings.

IN NAVAL RESERVES. Daniels Says Men Want to Maintain Some Connection. Washington, Nov. 21. - Nearly all officers and men released under the navy's demobilization plan, Secretary Daniels said today, will be placed in the reserves, so as to be available in case of emergency. The secretary expressed the belief that practically every man who has the will desire to maintain some connection with the establishment. Where men desire to sever all connections, he added, some method will be found for their discharge.

AMERICAN MONUMENT. France to Erect Statue in Honor of America's Entry into War. Paris, Nov. 21. - A national subscription will be opened at once, for the creation of a monument commemorating America's entry into the war, it was announced today by the executive committee in charge. An appeal has been sent out to all municipalities in France to contribute.

PERSHING TELLS PROGRESS. Washington, Nov. 21. - Reporting on the march of the American Third army into territory evacuated by the Germans, Gen. Pershing's communication for Wednesday follows: "In the course of its advance today, the Third army crossed the German frontier of 1914, entered the grand duchy of Luxembourg and progressed further into southern Belgium. Our columns passed through the towns of Esch and Arlon, and by evening had reached the general line of Gandrinan-Wollmeringen-Dudelange-Mondercange - Autebas-Grendel."

PROHIBITION LOOMS UP. Concord, N. H. - (I. N. S.) - Advocates of prohibition state that ratification of the federal "dry" amendment is assured in this state when the legislature convenes in January. A canvass of the members-elect shows that fifteen of the twenty-four senators have filed written pledges to vote for the prohibition amendment to the federal constitution, and five others were elected as prohibitionists, a total of twenty against four

opposed or unpledged. Of the 400 members-elect of the new house, 250 are pledged for prohibition and several others are verbally pledged. COUGHS UP BIG PIN. Virginia, Ill. - (I. N. S.) - Released with a fit of coughing, Beatrice Davis, aged 13, dislodged a large pin which she had swallowed two years ago. It was fattened and tarminated when recovered.
