

NAVY BATTLESHIPS ANCHOR IN BOSPHORUS

Naval Officers and Men Since Armistice.

Constantinople, Wednesday, Nov. 25.—There were fifty British, French and Italian battleships, cruisers and destroyers in the allied squadron anchored today in the Bosphorus. The newspapers and the nation acclaim the allied squadrons as the British and French contingents have been established in Constantinople. A British aerial force of the outskirts of the city, and prices in Constantinople, according to the Turkish finance ministry, have risen twenty lines above the ruling before the war. Disorganization of the railroads in Asia today compelled the government to abandon the ration of cheap flour which it issued during the war.

The fifty-nine officers and men who have remained with the United States troops in Constantinople since the Horn since diplomatic relations were severed, twenty-five have been reported well.

"Regardless of the wishes of individuals or groups," said Mr. Morrison, "any reduction of present wage scales in this country will be opposed by the workers, who will not accept wage reductions for the simple reason that this procedure will lower their standard of living, and by 'standard of living' I refer to substantial food, clothing, housing and all necessities to a well ordered life."
