

# U. S. SOLDIERS HOME DURING PEACE

### WHY THEY NOT TO RETURN SOON

Gen. March Corrects Impression That Southern Unit is Coming Home at Once.

### 39th, 76th, 87th INSTEAD

Between 150,000 and 175,000 Men Given as December Transportation Plan.

Washington, Nov. 29.—Gen. Pershing has designated for early conveyance to the United States a total of 145,000 officers and 79,645 men, Gen. March announced today. The units comprising these men will be made public later.

Included in those to return are the following units: The 39th, 76th and 87th divisions (Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi and southern Alabama national army troops, Arkansas, Mississippi and Louisiana national guard troops). The other troops comprise artillery units and army corps troops.

Gen. Pershing reported the following official casualties to Nov. 26:

Gen. Pershing directed the President's medal to be conferred on Gen. Pershing, Lieut. Gen. Liggett and Lieut. Gen. Dickman, Medal of Honor recipients.

### PLANS FOR BRINGING SOLDIERS HOME

The total troops already designated for early discharge in the United States as given as 649,000. These include depot and development battalions, 8,000; railway troops, 20,000; United States guards, 26,000; tank corps, 7,000; chemical warfare troops, 7,000; central officers training corps, 60,000. Already 46,378 men have been mustered out at the camps in this country. The schedule under which the departments are bringing the boys over here is 1,000 men per camp per day to be released, and Gen. March said every effort would be made to reach this total.

### PLANS FOR BRINGING SOLDIERS HOME

Plans for bringing soldiers home were announced today. The use of hospital ships for severely wounded and especially fitted transports for the slightly wounded and convalescing boys over here, the use of the Pullman company has been directed to convert a number of sleepers into hospital cars to carry them to army reconstruction hospitals, base hospitals and other places already provided.

### REPORTS FROM GEN. PERSHING

Reports from Gen. Pershing show American soldiers captured by Germany are returning to the American front. Gen. March said, and the department has received no report of mistreatment of them by the enemy. Most of the men entering the United States are from the occupation since that the army holds the front line.

Washington, Nov. 29.—The Forty-second division of the American expeditionary forces in France has been cited by Maj. Gen. Charles P. Sumner, commanding the Fifth army corps, for the service rendered and the bravery displayed by its personnel. The general order, issued by the division at the headquarters of the corps in France, reached here today.

Expressing appreciation of the formation of its service with the Fifth army corps, Maj. Gen. Sumner particularly commends the Eighty-fourth infantry brigade and Sixty-seventh field artillery brigade units of the Eighty-fourth brigade. Under the command of Brig. Gen. Douglas MacArthur, who, on numerous occasions, has been cited for bravery and dash on the western front, Gen. MacArthur has been presented with the French croix de guerre, and on his American service wears two palm leaves.

## GERMANY'S CONFESSION OF GUILT



When the adjustment of damages for sinkings by submarines comes before the peace conference, Germany will find a bit of her exaggerated propaganda turned against her inconvincently. This chart is headed "England's Plight." The zig-zag line from the Atlantic around through the North sea to the channel is marked "Blockade Limits." In the lower left-hand corner is printed this quotation, signed "Churchill": "It is entirely for lack of ships that I have had to reduce by hundreds of thousands of tons the steel for shells, for the making of which the factories, fuses, guns and crew are all wanting." In right-hand corner (large type): "Twelve Months of Unrestricted U-Boat Warfare in the Northern Theatre of Sea War." At the foot of the map is the ship destroyed by mine or before February 1, 1917, is indicated in this map.

### EX-KAISER FORMALLY RE-ANNOUNCES ALL RIGHTS

Herr Hohenzollern Signs Decree of Abdication Giving Up Future Claims to German and Prussian Thrones and Releasing His Officials From Oaths of Fealty.

Amsterdam, Nov. 30.—A formal decree of abdication has been signed by William II, renouncing forever all rights to the imperial crown of the kingdom of Prussia and releasing all officials from their oath of allegiance. London, Nov. 30.—Former Emperor William signed his abdication. Amerongen, Holland, yesterday, according to a dispatch to the Wolff bureau, transmitted by the Exchange telegraph corporation at Amsterdam. The abdication decree, according to the message, expressed the wish that "the new regent" would be able to protect the German people against anarchy, starvation and foreign supremacy. The use of the word "regent" in the message is commented upon here as possibly significant.
