TO CONTINUE WORK

Mal. Rutledge Smith, Chairman Council of Defense, Gives Out Statement. Nashville, Dec. 5.—(Special.)—That the work of the Council of National Defense will continue until demobilization and the readjustment process is completed is evidenced by a telegram just received by Mal. Rutledge Smith, chairman of the State Council of Defense and southern representative of the national council. The national council in session at Washington under date of Dec. 2 passed the following resolutions:

"Resolved, by the Council of National Defense, composed of the secretaries of war, navy, interior, agriculture, commerce and labor, that the council of defense system, composed of state, county, community and municipal councils and the state divisions and local units of the woman's committee of the Council of National Defense, be continued with the national interest for the purpose of cooperation with and to supplement federal agencies in meeting the exigencies and emergencies incident to post-war readjustment and especially for the purpose of demobilization and a normal demobilization of soldiers, sailors and war workers to the end that they may most wisely be reabsorbed into peace-time pursuits; and, be it further

purpose the Council of Defense recommends and it does hereby recommend to the several governors, state councils and state legislatures that all legislative acts creating state councils or committees of public safety be so amended where necessary as to make it possible for the council of defense system throughout the country to perform the foregoing functions, so long as shall appear to be necessary.

In commenting upon the action of the national council as indicated above, Mal. Smith said: "When last in conference with the members of the national council in Washington, on Nov. 11, when the armistice was signed, it was quite evident that an enormous task was yet before the council of defense system. This system was brought into existence by congress for the purpose of organizing the nation for war, and this it successfully did. It being so thoroughly well acquainted with the situation, it followed that it was the only organization in existence that could successfully demobilize or organize the nation for peace. We have undertaken this arduous task with a firm confidence and belief that we will be able to effect a readjustment as scientifically and exact as we did in setting up the nation for war."

Two Albanians Also in German Camps. Washington, Dec. 5.—A list of American soldiers in German prison camps, issued today by the war department, includes: At Camp Rastatt—Corpl. Arthur Edwards, Meltonville, Ala.; Ralph V. Morris, Florence, Miss. Reported good health in an unknown camp. Privates Josiah H. Druggier, Colocks, Tenn.; John William C. Gibson, Tumas, Tenn.; and Hill Houston, River Falls, Ala.

ALLIES IN FULL ACCORD

Paris, Dec. 5.—(Havas).—There is complete agreement between the allies on all questions, particularly that concerning the former German emperor, declared Premier Clemenceau on his return from London last night. He expressed deep satisfaction over the important results obtained at the conference.

SHERMAN HITS MANN

Illinois Senator Warns Republicans Against Loss Majority. Washington, Dec. 5.—The statement issued several days ago by Representative Mann, republican leader in the house, deprecating attempts to embarrass President Wilson's mission abroad, drew a vigorous attack in the senate today from Senator Sherman, of Illinois, republican. Without mentioning Mr. Mann by name, the senator referred to him as a candidate for speaker who had issued the statement.

"It's much more powerful here in Washington than at home," Senator Sherman shouted. "I take no orders from this self-constituted and needless republican party hailing from Illinois. His leadership in the west coast beginning in 1912 and continuing down to 1918, to consider what leader they're following."

NO VETERANS TO RETURN

Says Baker, Before Peace is Made Formally. Washington, Dec. 5.—Secretary Baker gave it as his personal opinion Thursday that none of the veteran divisions of the American army in France will return home before peace formally is declared. He indicated that the tried fighting men would compose the bulk of the force to be kept in Europe for the present.

REFUSED TO RETIRE

Gadsden, Ala. Boy Mentioned in Orders For Gallant Conduct. Gadsden, Ala., Dec. 5.—(Special.)—Sergt. Arthur Lutes, company L, 167th infantry, has been cited for heroic conduct by the commanding general of the 42nd division. This information was received by his father in a letter in which was enclosed a copy of the citation. The young soldier was 18 years old on Sept. 22, 1918. He has been in the service for more than two years, having been on the Mexican border in 1916. The following is a copy of the citation:
