ANNIHILATION FACED BY REDS

Poles Launch Great New Converging Attack 30 Miles North of Warsaw.

MENACE DISAPPEARING

Paris, Aug. 20.—(A. P.)—The military successes of the Poles continued yesterday, according to a report to the foreign office today from the military mission in Warsaw, under plans elaborated by the French Gen. Weygand and his staff of more than 600 French officers.

All these officers now are either actively in command of the forces that are freeing Warsaw from the Russian soviet menace or are aiding the Polish commanders.

Lukow Abandoned.
London, Aug. 20.—The Russian soviet forces have abandoned Lukow, sixty-eight miles southeast of Warsaw, and Radin, eighty miles to the southeast of the Polish capital, according to the communique issued Thursday by the Moscow government. The communique claims that the Poles were driven back seven miles from Ciechanow, forty-five miles northwest of Warsaw. The statement reads:

"The fighting at Pionsk (northwest of Warsaw) continues. Southwest of Ciechanow we have driven back the enemy. We are seven miles from Ciechanow.

"We have abandoned Lukow and Radin and fighting is proceeding for Biela and Wlodawa (Biela is twenty-five miles northeast of Radin and Wlodawa forty-two miles southeast of Radin), in the Chom and Prusibiesow regions

(southeast of Lublin) our advance continues."

The Polish left wing has taken Pultusk, about thirty-five miles north of Warsaw, and is continuing its progress in the direction of Mlawa. In the center the Polish forces are marching in the direction of Ostrolenka, twenty-two miles southwest of Lomza.

The extreme right wing of the Polish army is marching on Brest Litovsk, on the Bug river, 120 miles east of Warsaw, according to an official statement on the fighting issued shortly before last midnight. The right wing has captured Stedec and Belsk, the statement says.

Capture of Poles Claimed.
London, Aug. 20.—The capture of 7,000 prisoners is claimed by the soviet war office in a communique wirelessly from Moscow today. Advances by the Polish army are admitted.

The communique says:

"At Houza we took 7,000 prisoners. We have reached a point seven miles from Kiechanoff. We have abandoned Lukow, sixty miles east of Warsaw, and Radzyn, fifteen miles southeast of Lukow. Fighting is proceeding near Biela and Wlodawa, in the sector of Brest-Litovsk. In the region of Chelm (near the Galician frontier) our advance continues."

Warsaw, Aug. 20.—(I. N. S.)—A gigantic encircling movement is being swiftly carried out by the Polish army between Brest-Litovsk and Demblin, and dispatches from the front today indicated that the bulk of the Russian army in Poland was in danger of being cut off, if this has not already been accomplished.

One hundred thousand Russian troops have been thrown into panicky rout by the smashing of their front at many points.

The Russians threw away guns and ammunition in their wild flight. The roads and fields leading from the old front are strewn with equipment discarded by the panic-stricken Russians.

The Poles are reported to have recaptured the great fortress of Brest-Litovsk.

The Poles are launching a great new converging attack from Pultusk, thirty miles north of Warsaw.

A general Polish advance along the entire 400 miles of battlefield is momentarily expected.

The Russians are falling back in disorder north and east of Warsaw.

The Poles captured more than 10,000 prisoners and vast quantities of guns and ammunition.

The foreign missions that went from Warsaw to Posen have been ordered to return, as all danger to this city is now past.

The archbishop of Warsaw has ordered a day of thanksgiving with prayers, to celebrate the deliverance of the city.

The defeat of the red army was due to the skillful plans of the French and British army officers who are directing the Polish operations.

(This is the first revelation that British officers have been taking an active part in aiding the Poles. Previous dispatches referred only to French army officers.)

Armen report great confusion behind the Russian lines. It is believed that the roads will not be able to rally for another attempt against Warsaw.

While the Russian advance towards the Vistula has been brought to a standstill and the Russians are being thrown back at many points on the front, the soviet army in Galicia is attempting to attack to divert the attention of the Poles. The Russians that have been threatening Lemberg have crossed the Bug river.

It is considered that French and Polish co-operation in the commands of the various forces now has reached a satisfactory stage. J. J. Jusserand and Lord d'Abernon, respectively, the heads of the French and British missions to Poland, have returned to Warsaw from Posen for a conference with Gen. Weygand and the Polish staff.

The situation at Danzig is still causing worry, but it is expected to be cleared up when two French battalions, now on the way there, arrive and offers Sir Reginald T. Tower, the allied high commissioner at Danzig, sufficient forces to control the pier and permit the unloading of Polish munitions.

London, Aug. 20.—The Poles have advanced fifty miles on a 125-mile front east of Warsaw and forty miles north of Warsaw, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from the Polish capital this afternoon. The Poles have reached Ciechanow on the Warsaw-Danzig railway and Pultusk. East of Warsaw the Poles have taken Nowominsk, Kaluzyn, Stedec and Leske.

Poles Seize Villages.
Berlin, Aug. 20.—Two thousand Poles have seized many villages in the vicinity of the Silesian town of Kattowitz where street battles between French and German resulted in scores of casualties during the last few days.


