

HOUSE ADOPTS FORDNEY BILL

Vote on Emergency Tariff 196 to 86—Defiant Minority Protests.

POLITICAL LINES ASIDE

Finis Garrett, of Tennessee, Charges Scheme to Split Democratic Party.

Washington, Dec. 22.—Over the protests of a defiant minority, the house last night adopted the Fordney emergency tariff bill by a vote of 196 to 86. The vote was taken at 8:45, after eight hours of debate.

Political lines were swept aside in the final vote, forty-one democrats and one prohibitionist combining with 154 republicans in supporting the measure, while fourteen republicans lined up with seventy-two democrats against the bill.

It was evident long before the vote was taken that supporters of the measure, designed to protect some twenty odd farm products for a ten months' period, had the situation well in hand. But Representative Rainey (Dem., Ill.), leading the opposition, opened a bitter attack which increased in intensity as the debate wore on.

Paragraph by paragraph he assaulted the measure, while the republicans, with a loud roar of "noes," sent his proposed amendments down to defeat. A few republicans supported him in his attack, but a score of his own party turned from their traditional stand against a high tariff to join the majority.

Opposition charged that the measure would send the cost of living higher and branded it as class legislation. Defenders on the other hand, said it would save the agricultural industry.

Chairman Fordney, of the ways and means committee, which reported the measure in opening debate, declared the bill was not scientific and admitted it was hastily drawn, but asserted that it was the best that could be had at this time.

Representative Long (Dem., Tex.), speaking in support of the bill, said he felt it was the only way in which congress could extend the relief so urgently needed by the farmers.

Representative Madden (Rep., Tex.), however, assailed his colleagues for opening the way to a renewal of "prohibitive living costs." Pointing his finger at the majority leaders' desk, he said:

Tennessee Attacks Bill. "You men will make two lamb chops cost \$1.30 again, and Fordney will make our suits of clothes cost 100 per cent. more."

Representative Garrett (dem., Tenn.), said he saw "in this bill a determined effort to divide the democratic party to make members of that party turn their backs on every principle of taxation for which the party has stood in its whole history."

"I cannot believe the republican leaders seriously hope to get this bill passed," he added. "I am convinced it is a fine piece of political strategy."

In his attempt at amendment, Mr. Rainey sought to show that the bill for the most part, carried higher rates than the Payne-Aldrich tariff. He also

Predict Defeat for Tariff Bill in Senate

Washington, Dec. 22.—(A. P.)—Despite the more than 100 majority by which the Fordney emergency tariff bill passed the house last night, many opponents of the measure today said they were almost convinced it would either be defeated or radically amended in the senate. Although party lines were largely swept aside in the vote in the house, which was 196 to 86, it was not believed this would occur in the senate, where the majority is smaller. The measure, designed to protect more than a score of agricultural products for a ten months' period, was passed by the house after eight hours of heated debate in which the opposition was led by representative Henry T. Rainey, democrat of Illinois, while a few republicans supported his attack on the measure, more than a score of his own party joined the majority.

"I expect," he continued, "to see congress re-enact either the Dingley or the Payne-Aldrich schedules."

The first attempt to amend the bill was defeated without a record vote. Representative Norton (rep., Minn.), sought to exempt from duty, wheat which was purchased under contract prior to December 1, 1920. He contended that as written the bill would be retroactive since wheat from Canada largely was bought on contract last fall without knowledge of the proposed import duty.

He asserted the provisions of the measure would result in the country "millions of dollars—may ruin some of them," unless these contracts are exempted from the bill.

The house also voted down an amendment introduced by Mr. Rainey fixing the duty on wheat at 25 cents instead of 30 cents per bushel.

Representative Small (dem., N. C.), made an unsuccessful attempt to have the levy on wheat flour of 20 per cent. ad valorem stricken out of the bill.

The bill was attacked by Representative Collier, of Mississippi, and Hull, of Tennessee, both democratic members of the ways and means committee. Mr. Collier declared he was "touched by the tender solicitude of those who framed the bill for the cotton growers of the south."

RENT JUMPS FROM \$32 TO \$50 PER MONTH

This Will Be Increase Put on Coolidge When He Moves to Washington.

Washington, Dec. 22.—(Special.)—Vice-President-elect and Mrs. Calvin Coolidge, who have been paying a rental of \$32 a month for their residence in Boston, are to pay \$50 a month for residence here, which will meet their requirements in their new abode.
