Organs of Radicalism.

We are reminded of this in noting the tenacity with which these "thieves own," cling to the "bloody shirt" and "outrage lie" business; and now that there seems to exist no further occasion to repeat the prevarications of the "Bureau of Justice" at Washington, and that the whole Northern press, both Republican and Democratic, only refer to such statements as "downright lies;" it seems ludicrous, and the farce should end after such a "set down" as these people were the recipients of on the 3d of last November.

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Crumbs of Comfort.

This Judicial and Senatorial District are composed of the same parishes—DeSoto, Red River, Sabine and Natchitoches; and the throwing out of DeSoto entire—wards 5 and 6 of Natchitoches, 4 of Sabine and 3 of Red River, gives Twitchel 102 majority for the Senate, which, taking it all in all, is the most glaring and villainous fraud that ever was perpetrated upon a people.

But the "powers that be," attempt, in a clumsy manner, to soothe our feelings with the crumb (and we must say a truly small morsel) of the judiciary of the 17th District, in place of the notorious Judge H. C. Myers, and Dist. Atty. J. E. Breda.

The affidavits upon which wards 5 and 6 of this parish were thrown out, were signed by six persons who never resided in this Parish and are unknown to every man, woman or child living either in the above named wards or in the Parish.

We repeat that this is no time for these people to attempt to temporize with us in such a manner as the offer of a Dist. Judge and Attorney in exchange for all the rights and liberties that we hold dear.

What can we do?—some will ask. We answer them—Do you propose to vote in 1876, in 1878, in 1880, and have this very fraud repeated? Do you not know that if you submit once it will be continually perpetuated?

We have rights; among them is that of a security of the ballot; if we will not fight for that we had better surrender all.

For us, we say to our people, you must now meet this issue fairly in the face, and like men knowing their liberties, show to the world that you dare maintain them.

Resolutions of the Committee of Seventy.

Whereas, the Returning Board of the Republican party in New Orleans, have ignored the numerous affidavits of registered citizens of this parish, who have proven beyond doubt that they themselves, as well as many other of our registered citizens, have been unjustly, fraudulently, by violence and intimidation, deprived of their rights to vote the People's ticket at the late election in wards 9, 10 and 11, in this parish, through the illegal workings and machinations of certain leaders and members of the Republican party, and refused to throw out boxes 9 and 10, as they were in justice and in duty bound to do, according to the facts brought to their notice in said affidavits, and under the law.

And whereas, the said Returning Board have thrown out the boxes in wards 5 and 6, in which a large majority had been given to the candidates on the People's ticket in this parish, at the last election, upon the false and lying affidavits of certain persons purporting to be of this parish, who are unknown to any resident of this parish, and who, by fraud and perjury have slandered our people, and thus deprived them of their legal and fairly elected members of the Legislature, and other officers of their choice, and entailed ruin and disaster upon us, in particular, and the entire people of this State, in general.

Be it therefore Resolved, That we, the people of Natchitoches parish, do hereby declare that we refuse to recognize the fraudulent and illegal returns of the Returning Board, so far as this parish is concerned, and pledge ourselves to resist to the last extremity, this or any other attempt to deprive us of one jot or tittle of our rights or liberties.
