VIRGINIA BONDS.

tion of the Act Amending the Rid dieberger Law. We publish the following letter to Colonel Ruffin, the Second Auditor, from General Wickham, chairman of the Senate Committee of Finance, in construction of the late law amending the Riddleberger-law and in exposition of the policy of that amendment. We understand that the same construction has been given by counsel who has been consulted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Dear Sir,—You ask me in regard to the construction of the following clause in the act passed at the last General Assembly amending the Riddleberger bill:

"And provided further, after the passage of this act, the new bonds issued shall be issued with such coupons or interest only thereon as shall mature after actual date of exchange."

infer as to the construction of it.
It seems to me that the meaning is It seems to me that the meaning is as clear as language can make it.

No bond can be issued between this and the 31st day of December with any coupons upon it except those which mature on January 1, 1885, and after. No bond can be issued between January 1, 1885, and June 30, 1885, with any coupons attached except those that mature July 1, 1885, and after. And this provision relates to the interest and coupons which mature between January 1, 1883, and January 1, 1885, both inclusive, offered for funding, as well as to the bonds themselyes with coupons anterior to January 1, 1883, when offered for funding.

Thus a bondholder, bringing in his bonds with coupons maturing prior to January 1, 1883, if consols, will receive the amount of bonds to which he was entitled under Clause A of the Riddleberger act.

So, with the 10-40 and other classes, he

So, with the 10-40 and other classes, he would receive the bonds and interest provided for in that act.

If, in addition, the man who brought the 10-40 bonds and coupons maturing anterior to July 1, 1883, brought also coupons maturing January, 1883, to January, 1885, both inclusive, or for any portion of that time, he would receive bonds dollar for dollar for the last-named coupons.

If the person brought cousol bonds or the other classes of debt, he would receive, in addition to the bonds he was entitled to under their respective classes, as named in the lettered clauses of said act, for any interest or coupons which he might produce accruing between January, 1883, and January, 1885, or any part thereof, fifty cents in the dollar.

The funding of this class of coupons will relieve the Treasury of the necessity of keeping on hand a sum of money sufficient to pay two years' interest on the unfunded portion of the debt, which otherwise it would have been necessary to de. And this money thus released will enable the State to buy up an amount of new 3 percent, bonds more than sufficient to ofset this apparent increase of the debt, and leave it a considerable surplus of purchased bonds to be turned over to the Sinking Fund for cancellation. A leaking cap in the boiler-house attached to the Belmont Oil-Works, at Miffin street and Long Line, caused the instant death of one employed, the stail jojury of another, and the severe wounding of a third, last svening. At 6:15 o'clock Fireman Joseph Telly saw that one of the cape of the boiler was leaking. He called John B. Simpson, the boss stillman or night superintendent, and Hugh Ganiz, a stillman in another part of the works. The three men made preparations to stop the leak. A monkey-wrench was procured by Simpson, and the three men clustered around the little point from which the steam was escaping. Simpson clasped the wrench around the nut securing the cap and made two or three turns.

An explosion followed. Simpson was thrown from his perch, and Ganiz yelled to Tully: "Draw the fires!" Tully sprang to the furnace and was in the act of carrying out the stiliman's advice, when a second explosion occurred. The furnace-door was blown out and a burst of flame followed. Tully was in a stooping position, and the lumense tongue of flame wrapped his head and chest. He fell back with a scream of pain, and Ganiz sprang to his assistance. At this instant a second puff of steam and fire shot out and enveloped the rescuer about his legs and loins.
