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DANVILLE.

Some Railroad Matters-Moving for Better Facilities-The Atlantic and Danville-Religious Notes. (Correspondence of the Richmond Dispatch.)

Colonel J. M. Neal has just returned from Richmond. Danville officials on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce and asked for better depot facilities here. He was told that hereafter passenger trains would run over to Danville from Dundee as soon as they arrived, and then run back to Dundee for supper; that the gauge of the Richmond and Danville and Virginia Midland would be made to conform to the standard gauge about the first of June, and that date Danville should have a union depot.

Colonel Neal was also promised that passenger coaches would be run on some of the freight trains on the Richmond Danville road. There is a strong sentiment here now in favor of the Atlantic and Danville railroad. This road (narrow gauge) begins at Clarendon, on the James river, and runs to the westward, where it is built as far as Hicksford, in Greensville county, a distance of some thirty-three miles. It is now making in this direction, with a view to connection with the Danville and New-River road of the same gauge. This would give the Danville section direct communication with deep water, and would secure a competing line, of which it stands so much in need. Mr. B. D. Tillar, of the House of Delegates, is president of the road. He is a live business-man and a man of considerable means. The directors of the road are principally from Norfolk and the immediate vicinity.

Newspaper News from New Orleans. A Cincinnati telegram says: The Enquirer to-day says C. P. Huntington will consolidate his property east of the Mississippi at an early date. The Newport News and Mississippi Valley railroad is to be the title of the new company, which will embrace the Chesapeake and Ohio, extending from Newport News, Va., to Huntington, W. Va., 511 miles; Elizabethtown, Lexington, and Big Sandy, Huntington to Lexington, Ky., 139 miles; Chesapeake, Ohio and Southern, Louisville to Memphis, 392 miles; Louisville, New Orleans and Texas, Memphis to New Orleans, 533 miles, and the Kentucky Central, with 253 miles.

These roads, with an aggregate mileage of 1,828 miles, are to be under one general management. The Mayville and Big-Sandy road will be extended from Ashland, Ky., to Cincinnati this year. This will shorten the distance about sixty miles. The missing link in his through system between Lexington and Louisville will be built, unless the existing road between these cities can be bought at a satisfactory price. It is said that Mr. Huntington has his eye on the Louisville, Frankfort and St. Louis road, which would give him a line into St. Louis, with the aid of the Louisville and Nashville.
