About two weeks ago a warrant was sworn out for the arrest of Hicks charging him with stealing something from O. H. Chalkley & Co., of Richmond. Since that time he has been trying to avoid arrest and has remained outside the city limits. It is thought probable that by so exposing himself he caught a deep cold and that from it he died.

KILLED HIS WIFE.

A BRUTAL MURDER NEAR THE CITY OF PORTSMOUTH.

A Negro Clubs His Wife to Death Because His Dinner was Not Ready.

[Special telegram to the Dispatch.]

PORTSMOUTH, Va., July 20.—A negro man named Lewis West, living on the Western branch, five miles from Portsmouth, killed his wife, Mary Ann West, this afternoon by beating her to death with a club. The man had been in the habit of abusing his wife unmercifully at times, and to-day because his dinner was not ready when he came into the house he seized an oaken club and beat her over the head until her brutal force was satisfied. She lived only a few hours, and her cries attracted a crowd of colored people to her house. The murderer was promptly arrested by Constable B. F. Adams and carried before Justice Jesse Skeeter, who committed him to the county jail for trial.

CULPEPER. Fair Weather and Happy Farmers.—(Correspondence of the Richmond Dispatch.)

CULPEPER, July 19, 1886. At length we have been able to count three fair days after weeks of clouds and rain. The effect was plainly visible on the faces of our farmer friends attending our court to-day, and we were glad to learn from all parts of our county that the fears entertained as to damage to our wheat crop were groundless. The wheat is but little injured by the long wet spell, and will yet make a good turnout. A considerable quantity of hay has been lost, but quite a large crop yet remains, while the prospects of the oat and corn crops are very flattering.

Noticing the Defaulting Treasurer. (By telegraph to the Dispatch.)

HARRISBURG, Va., July 20.—S. R. Sterling, the defaulting treasurer of this county, was to-day arraigned before the County Court for trial. Seventeen indictments against him were read, to which he pleaded not guilty. On motion of his counsel the trial was then postponed until August 17th on account of the illness of witnesses. The prisoner renewed his bail and was discharged. He was looking wretched, and many think he will not live to be brought to trial.

MURDER FOR MONEY. An Aged Wisconsin Farmer and His Wife Shot by a Farm-Hand.

A Jamesville special says: Henry Zarch, a wealthy farmer, aged seventy-six years, and his wife, aged sixty-five, living two miles west of here, were murdered last night for their money. They lived alone, and had in their employ a boy about sixteen years old. Last night the boy, who resides in the city, came home this morning on returning to work he went to the barn, and found the body of Mr. Zarch lying under one of the cows, as if he had been in the act of milking when he fell. The boy supposed he had fallen in a fit, as he entered the house and found the balance of the family safe and sound. He immediately went to the house to inform Mrs. Zarch. He called to her, but received no response. He then looked into the dining-room and saw her dead body lying on the floor. He informed the neighbors and a physician. An examination of the body showed that Mr. Zarch had been shot in the back of the neck, the ball lodging at the base of the brain. Mrs. Zarch had evidently been shot with the same revolver as the balance of the family. He went immediately to the house to inform Mrs. Zarch. He called to her, but received no response.
