H. HALL of the Holy Trinity church, who will officiate at the house, where the first services take place on Thursday morning at 9:30 o'clock.

At 10:30 A. M. the remains will be escorted to the church by the Thirtieth regiment.

There will be no black drapery in the church or house, nor will the family have any mourning.

Many times Mr. Beecher is said to have said in his sermons: "Strew flowers on my grave, but let no heathenish practice prevail of draping in black as a token of sorrow when a man has passed through death to eternal life."

The Sunday-school children of the Holy Trinity church, and the children of the Plymouth church, will be invited to attend in a body at the church at 4 o'clock Friday afternoon.

The body will lay in state at the church. Leading clergymen from all parts of the country will be present.

At the emergency meeting it was voted to issue tickets to members of the church.

It is believed that the church will be full.

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
