DEATH FROM BURNS.

PATTIE JOHNSON DIES FROM INJURIES SUSTAINED BY A LAMP EXPLOSION.

John Jennings, Who Threw the Flaming Missile, Not Yet Arrested—Inquest to Be Held To-day.

The flames of a lighted kerosene lamp, thrown from the hand of an angry man, caused an agonizing death in this city yesterday.

The man who died was named Pattie Johnson, and John Jennings is the man who, it is said, was held to answer for her life.

These parties, both disreputable negroes, had an altercation Tuesday night, and the result was the death of the woman.

At first it was not thought that she was seriously injured, but on the 27th it was discovered that she was fatally burned on her head, face and feet.

There were two negroes standing by at the time of the quarrel, but Jennings was the one who threw the flaming missile.

Before her death Pattie stated that she had two lamps, one of which she had lent to Jennings, and having broken the one she was using, she had thrown the flaming missile.
