It would damage him greatly if he were to veto such a measure and would also injure his party.

The Virginia Delegation. The Washington correspondent of the Alexandria Gazette quotes Chairman BAZEL GORDON as saying that the Virginia delegation to Chicago "is unpledged to any body and that the delegates go to the convention with the determination of supporting the man who, shall come to them when they reach there, stands the best chance of being elected, as Democratic success is what Virginians desire."

Senator DANIEL, who is also a delegate at large to the Chicago convention, is reported by this correspondent as being "in thorough accord with Mr. Gordon on the subject referred to." It is true that the CLEVELAND and anti-CLEVELAND lines were distinctly drawn at the State convention here in the election of district delegates, each side securing ten delegates, and that in the compromise on the delegates at large two were taken from each faction, but we, too, believe that our twenty-four men are patriots rather than partisans. It may be difficult for some of them to relinquish their present opinions as to the availability or non-availability of certain men, but that they will honestly endeavor so to do we cannot doubt.

We believe that in the coming Virginia convention to vote for the nominees of the Chicago convention; but our party seems to be in a disordered condition in New York, in North and South Carolina, in Louisiana, and in some other States, and the most careful inquiry should be made as to the likelihood of our losing any one of them.

A special hearing will be given to the case of New York. That will come up on the question of admitting the Syracuse delegation, and the convention will have all the facts before it to enable it to judge wisely. So, too, with the expected contest from Louisiana; but it will only be by making particular and pointed inquiries that the delegates generally can ascertain whether it would be safe to count on a solid South under any and all circumstances. If the condition of the party throughout the South is as good as it is in the Old Dominion it will be pleasant to know that fact; if there are dangers ahead, that should be known. The pilot who is in charge of the route will, if he is not going to be caught running his ship aground.

An ingenious fellow made a song little fortune out of the Syracuse convention, he told the delegates generally that he would be the one to carry the picture. They were sold out of boxes marked "Pull the string gently." The string on the face of one of the delegates was cut by the President, changing the expression of the face from one of serene gladness to one of disappointed love. These tears are what have delighted the statesmen very much indeed.

General EPPA HUNTER entered upon his senatorial duties yesterday; but he will be a silent member for some time. He is not in the line of the law of the body that the senator must address it unless for some extraordinary reason; during the first session of his term; but he may make himself active in committee work and do heaps of thinking and voting.

All the explanations made as to Mr. BAZEL GORDON's absence from the Cabinet meeting before yesterday show conclusively that the Secretary did not feel that he would be as comfortable in the President's presence as he was at the State Department, and the President, for his part, cheerfully forgave his Secretary's absence.
