Beer for Five Cents. The brewers are nearly all violently opposed to the talked-of increase of tax on beer. The price of that frothy but fascinating article in Cincinnati is \$3.50 per barrel. The tax is now \$1 per barrel, but the plan of Mr. Wells is to make it \$2—a great outrage.

We are not sure that the brewers would be losers—may be they would—but the retailers certainly would be. The ruling price per glass for beer everywhere in this country is 5 cents, and it is hardly possible for the retailers to raise this price; nor would it be practicable for them to lessen the size of the glass.

An increased tax would soon become very unpopular with many people if the price should be raised from 5 to 6 cents, or the glass reduced in size; but there is no danger of either. The price will not where it is. The glass will not be contracted. The brewers will market a cheaper article and share the balance of the loss, if any, with the retailers.

The brewers are like all other classes of taxpayers. They think that they pay plenty now, and they would have the government leave them alone and go after other people. Very probably they are right. Such is human nature. We hear other peoples' misfortunes with a howl only equalled by that with which they bear ours.
