WAS HE MURDERED?

The Negro Found Unconscious in Prince George Dead.

THE AFFAIR A MYSTERY.

New Flag and Flag-Pole on the Petersburg Custom-House-An Interesting Coincidence - Personal and General Brief Mention.

PETERSBURG, VA., October 5.-The

unknown negro who was found in an unconscious condition in Prince George county yesterday, a short distance outside of the city, with wounds about his head and legs, indicating that he had been terribly beaten, died at an early hour this morning at the house of William Booker (colored), to which he was taken for treatment. The unfortunate man never regained consciousness to tell how he came by his wounds, and nothing was found upon his person by which his identity could be established. The only property found in his pockets was three cents in money and a ticket from Clarence to Petersburg. The ticket may probably be traced to his identity. The deceased was apparently about 25 years old. He had a very ugly wound on the head, which showed the effects of a blow, instead of a shot, and the belief is that it came to his death by the blow of a hammer. The case is a very mysterious one and will probably lay the ingenuity of the authorities of the county to find out the particulars of the murder.

NEW POLE AND FLAG.

FIELD OF POLITICS.

Legislative Nominations in the State on Yesterday.

CAMPBELL AND LYNCHBURG.

A Mass-Meeting of the Democrats Held and Mr. Adam Clement Put Up for the Senate-Other Meetings and Conventions.

LYNCHBURG, VA., October 5.-[Special.]

A mass meeting of the Democratic voters of Campbell county was held at Rustburg to-day to nominate a candidate to represent that county and the city of Lynchburg in the Virginia Senate. Seven candidates-namely, Captain J. C. Featherstone, Fleming Saunders, Ardrige Hayden, Kirk, Alexander, Adam Clement, W. A. Withers, and Captain Samuel Adams-were placed in nomination. The voting was by districts, and the lowest candidate on each ballot was dropped. Adam Clement received the nomination, the final vote standing: Clement, 85; Featherstone, 45. Mr. Clement was one of its most prominent and useful citizens. Strong resolutions were passed endorsing Senator Daniel.

THE PARTIES IN WASHINGTON.

Democrats Nominate - Republicans Endorse the Independents.

ABINGDON, VA., October 5.-[Special.]

The Democratic and the Republican parties each held a mass meeting here to-day, the Democrats to nominate a candidate for the House, in place of Colonel R. P. Carson, who declined the nomination tendered him a few days ago, and the Republicans to nominate a full ticket. Hon. Conally F. Trigg was nominated by the Democrats. The Republicans made no nominations, but endorsed the independent candidates, Joseph M. Butt and Andrew F. Rambo, the former a Democrat, and the latter a Republican. Butt and Rambo announced themselves as candidates only this morning. The Democratic meeting was harmonious and enthusiastic. The Republican meeting was slimly attended, and was without enthusiasm.

AN INDEPENDENT CANDIDATE.

WYTHEVILLE, VA., October 5.-[Special.]

The committees of the Democratic and "Fair Elections" parties, with a few other leading politicians of both sides, held a meeting this morning, and decided to make nominations for the House. Dr. S. R. Savers then declared himself an independent candidate, in favor of fair elections, and opposed to the Walton law. He is a popular and highly-respected citizen.

Captain Dan Lee for the House.

FREDERICKSBURG, VA., October 5.-[Special.]

A convention of the Democrats of Stafford and King George counties was held to-day at Fleet, Cox's store, in Stafford, and nominated for the House of Delegates Captain Dan. M. Lee, brother of ex-Governor Lee.

Medical attendance was summoned, and the prompt application of antivenom soon placed the operator out of danger.
