

ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND  
A SUIT FOR \$10,000 FOR INJURY TO  
PERSON.

Death of an Aged Lady—The New  
Depot Buildings at Petersburg—  
Not Yet Captured—Personal and  
General Notes.

PETERSBURG, VA., August 4.—(Special.)—In the Hastings Court today the trial of the suit of Frank W. Parks vs. the Petersburg Cotton-Mills Company, for \$20,000 damages, for injuries received, was commenced. Messrs. Alexander Hamilton and W. B. McIlwaine are counsel for the plaintiff, and Mr. R. E. Davis represents the defendant company. Parks is a young man who received his injuries by the fall of an elevator at the factory, where he was employed.

NEW RAILROAD DEPOSITS.

The Atlantic-Coast Line Railroad Company will shortly build new freight and passenger depots in this city, to take the place of the old building, on Washington street, which, ever since the construction of the Petersburg and Weldon railroad, back in the '30's, has been used for both purposes. The Common Council last night by unanimous vote granted the authority for the change of site and for the erection of the new depots. The freight depot will be on the large lot on the south side of Washington, west of Market street, and is to be a commodious structure. The passenger depot will be located on the western suburbs of the city, near the extremity of Washington street, and the assurance is given that it will be a handsome building, worthy of the great company which has expended \$500,000 in the construction of the belt-line around the city. The location of this depot will at first appear inconvenient to arriving and departing passengers from connection with the street-cars.

NOT YET CAPTURED.

Walter Lewis, the negro who yesterday attempted in a cowardly manner to kill Frank Stewart, also colored, has not yet been caught. Stewart, who was taken to the Home for the Sick, is much better to-day. The ball did not enter the brain, but glanced around under the scalp, and has been extracted.

NEWPORT NEWS MAYORALTY.

Judge Barham Renders His Decision in the Case.

NEWPORT NEWS, VA., August 4.—(Special.)—Judge J. T. Barham rendered his decision in the contested mayoralty election case at 11 o'clock this morning, and by it the entire vote of the Second Precinct polled at the last election is thrown out, on the ground that fraud was actually committed by the voters themselves to the detriment of the interests of ex-Mayor W. A. Post. If Mr. Moss is to retain his position as Mayor of Newport News for the term of two years, he must prove in court, by the presence of the individual voters, that he received a sufficient number of votes to give him a majority. In case he fails to prove that, he will be unseated, and Mr. Post will be reinstated.

A HORSE-THIEF CAUGHT.

But He Managed to Escape from Jail.

SCOTTSVILLE, VA., August 4.—(Special.)—A horse-thief was caught here yesterday. A negro man about 20 years of age rode up to Hotel Scottsville yesterday afternoon on a beautiful young horse, which were a fine saddle and bridle, and offered them to the proprietor, Mr. E. L. Goodman, for \$20. Mr. Goodman asked him a good many questions about the horse, where he came from, &c., in order to draw him out, as he suspected something wrong. He also offered to trade him a watch and pistol, but the negro wanted money, and finally fell in price to \$25 cash. In the mean time he had the horse, and he received a telegram from the Chief of Police of Charlottesville, stating that the horse of the negro, resembling his description of the horse Mr. Goodman was learning that this had the boy arrested, permitted to sell the horse.

CLARKE COUNTY.

Republicans Not Harmonious—Personal and General.

HERRYVILLE, VA., August 4.—(Special.)—The Republicans of this county held their convention here on Monday. The meeting was called to order by County Chairman Charles Lee Estep, who stated his object to be the selection of two delegates to attend the congressional convention to be held at Lynchburg on August 20th, and also the appointment of a county

chairman and four members of the County Committee. The convention was made up of delegates from the four districts in the county, but, because of some irregularities in the credentials of the delegates from Greenway District they were not permitted to vote, and retired from the convention very much disgruntled. After the other convention had adjourned, they held a convention of their own, and proceeded to transact business just as if the first convention had not met. So there will be two sets of delegates. A meeting of J. E. B. Stuart Camp, No. 24, Sons of Confederate Veterans, was held at their hall Monday afternoon, at which committees were appointed to draft suitable resolutions relative to the death of Comrade Marshall Crow, and also to make arrangements for uniting with the local camps of veterans in a basket picnic and jollification to be held here early in September.

BLACK LICE CAUGHT.

Charged with Attempting to Burn Dickenson Jail.

CLINTWOOD, VA., August 4.—(Special.)—Isaac Mullins, better known as "Black Ike," who is charged with having made an attempt to burn the county jail a few nights ago, was arrested and lodged in jail on Saturday. Sheriff Kiser and a posse of men made a raid on him, where he was in hiding among his relatives a few miles below. They found him in the woods, and when the officers demanded his surrender he drew a dangerous-looking pistol and attempted to resist, but was overpowered.
