The busy season of the Richmond Fire Department begins in September, and the commissioners governing this branch of the city's affairs have consumed much of the dull summer months strengthening the department for the winter's work.

The four-days' furlough has been reduced among the companies and the regular engine has been busy substituting for the other machines while they were being repaired and repainted.

Disabled horses have been replaced, and, according to the Chief, everything is now in good condition.

Nine steam fire engines, three trucks, besides the chemical engine, can show up in good order in a few minutes.

Chief W. T. Taylor, a member of the Board of Fire Commissioners, has just returned from the Engineers Convention, at Salt Lake City. He is a close observer, and says that Richmond's department is above the average.
