

DR. LONG RIDES ADIEU. MAKES A PARTING ADDRESS AT THE MEDICAL COLLEGE. TO RETURN TO NORTH CAROLINA.



The Gifted Surgeon Will Go Back to His Own Home—He Has Kind Words for Richmond and for the College—Other Speeches Made.

Dr. W. W. Long, one of the most popular physicians in the city, and for several years a member of the faculty of the Medical College of Virginia, having determined to return to his former home in North Carolina, delivered, by invitation, in the amphitheatre of the college last night, a farewell address.

A large assemblage, consisting of members of the faculty of the Medical College of Virginia, and of the University College of Medicine and Surgery, and the students of the former institution, was present to do honor to the physician, who during his brief residence in this city has won a place in their hearts not easily to be filled.

DR. LONG'S ADDRESS. Dr. L. L. Levy presided over the meeting, and in a few appropriate remarks introduced Dr. Long, who, after the cheers that greeted his presentation had subsided, said:

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen: I don't like to say "good-by" to a place which I have called home for so long. It has been a privilege to me to have lived in this city, and to have been associated with you, my friends, during the past few years.
