ASHLAND SHAKEN UP BY THE EXPLOSION OF THE BOILER OF A LOCOMOTIVE.

No One Hurt, But a Host of Scrap-Iron and Other Debris—The Fireman's Experience—Narrow Escape.

ASHLAND, VA., April 16.—(Special.)—Engine No. 27, of the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac railroad, or, at least, what is left of it, stands on the siding in front of Randolph-Macon College. At 4:30 this afternoon it exploded its boiler with a terrific crash, scattering pieces of pipe, rods and ends of iron and sundry articles in every direction, within the radius of 200 yards.


