

A BREEZY MEETING.

CITIZENS OF BARTON HEIGHTS DIVIDED ON THE BOND ISSUE.

CHARGES AGAINST THE COUNCILMEN.

A Protracted and Lively Debate Ends in Disorder—Some Talk of Resigning Charters—Much Opposition to Proposed New Water-Works.

Barton Heights, the gentle and suburban suburb on the northern hill, was visited by a veritable maelstrom of political sensation last night.

MATTER OF ENDOWMENTS DISCUSSED AT CHARLOTTE.

THE NORTHERN ASSEMBLY.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., May 26.—After the opening exercises the Presbyterian Assembly to-day heard the report on Sabbath schools, which was docketed. Cuban Leader Wounded. HABANA, May 26.—It is officially announced that General Castillo, the insurgent leader, was wounded in the breast in an engagement which took place recently between his forces and the United States troops. Insurgents were killed at the same time.

Murderers of Yuzuff Sentenced. WASHINGTON, D. C., May 25.—Major Terrell, at Constantinople, has informed the State Department that the two murderers of Yuzuff, the man killed while distributing American relief funds in Bulgaria, Turkey, have been sentenced to fifteen years' imprisonment at hard labor.

Japan Wouldn't Have Hawaii. MONTREAL, QUEBEC, May 25.—Marquis Ito, in an interview to-day, said that the talk in the United States about the desire of Japan to buy Hawaii was a fiction. "Japan would not buy Hawaii," he said, "if it could be had for the asking."

Storage Warehouse Burned. SAVANNAH, GA., May 25.—The Savannah District Messenger and Delivery Company's storage warehouse was burned to-day. The loss is roughly estimated at \$50,000. The amount of insurance is unknown. A large amount of property was stored in the warehouse.
