MANY BILLS PASSED. A CONSIDERABLE NUMBER DISPOSED OF IN EACH BRANCH. TO ENTER OFFICE WITHOUT SALARIES. Measures Proposed by Which the Pay of Judges and State Officers May Be Reduced After Their Terms Begin—The Turnbull Investigation. The General Assembly yesterday passed a number of bills, many of them of a purely local nature. The Senate enacted, with amendments, Mr. Folke's bill for the protection of the labels of labor unions, and concurred in the House resolution, appointing a committee of six members of each branch to investigate the objections of Mr. Buford, of Brunswick, against electing Judge N. S. Turnbull as judge for that county. An important amendment makes it within the power of the committee to send for persons and papers in conducting the investigation. Much of the time of the House was taken up in discussing the bill requiring bonds, notes, and other evidences of debt to be listed for taxation, and a motion to refuse to order the bill to its engrossment was lost. A bill aimed to prevent discrimination by railroads between the "long" and "short haul," was introduced in the House, as was one looking to the restoration of State banks. The Day in the Senate. The Lieutenant-Governor called the Senate to order at noon yesterday, and Rabbi E. N. Calisch made the opening prayer. A bill was offered by Mr. Barksdale, providing that in any action, either at law, on motion, or in chancery, upon a note, bond, or other evidence of debt, the court in which said action is brought or motion made, or bill in chancery filed, before any decree or judgment is given, shall require it to be proven that said note, bond, or evidence of debt shall have been listed for taxation. TO PROTECT THE STATE'S RIGHTS. Mr. Le Cato introduced a resolution, providing that the Commonwealth's Attorney of Accomac county be empowered to institute proceedings to protect the rights of the Commonwealth in the matter of a certain survey of the riparian shores of Fox Island, or Fox Islands, in the county of Accomac. Mr. Maynard introduced a bill in relation to the acquisition of branch railroads by which the president and directors of any company incorporated to construct a railroad or other public utility, or to acquire any other public utility, shall be liable for any improvement exceeding five miles in length constructed, as under the present law, but may, by a vote of two thirds of all the stockholders, have made, or purchase, branch roads or lateral works not exceeding twenty miles in length. BILLS PASSED. The following bills were taken up and passed: House bill to protect labels and trademarks of labor organizations was passed, with an amendment making the intent to deceive necessary to conviction in cases of goods sold under counterfeit labels. The following Senate bills were passed: To amend section 247 of the Code in relation to chancery causes submitted in vacation, etc. In relation to tax on lawyers, physicians, etc. To amend section 123 of the Code in relation to penalty upon express corporations, that may be charged for hauling goods, giving them ten days in which to correct the same. To amend section 174 of the Code in relation to notaries, etc. To legalize party primaries in the city of Charlottesville. THE TURNBULL INVESTIGATION. The Senate concurred in the resolution adopted by the House providing for the appointment of a joint committee of six senators and six delegates to investigate the objections made on the floor of the House of Delegates by Mr. Buford, of Brunswick, against the election of Judge N. S. Turnbull as judge for that county. The Chair announced as members of that committee on the part of the Senate Messrs. Boykin, Morris, Maynard, Letcher, Fairfax, and Jeffries. Mr. Morris said he thought he was probably too prejudiced to pass upon the case, and Mr. Fairfax asked to be excused. However, they later consented to serve. Mr. Morris saying he thought he could give due weight to all the evidence. On motion of Mr. Folke the powers of the committee were enlarged so as to authorize it to send for persons and papers in making the investigation. Mr. Wickham, as member of the joint committee appointed to wait upon the Governor and Lieutenant-Governor-elect and request of them to take the oath of office in the Hall of the House of Delegates, reported that duty discharged, and that the officials-elect had consented to do as requested. He reported further, that Hon. R. H. Caldwell, one of the judges of the Supreme Court, and former Speaker of the House, would administer the oath of office. The Senate adjourned at 1:30. House of Delegates. The House was called to order at noon by Speaker Ryan, and opened with prayer by Rev. Dr. W. G. Starr. Mr. A. P. Fitzpatrick introduced a bill providing that it shall be unlawful for a railroad or other transportation company chartered or doing business in Virginia to charge more per mile for the carrying of passengers or freight in this State than allowed under the interstate-commerce laws, and to abolish all discrimination between what is known as the "long and short haul." The measure is of the duty of the Railroad Commissioner to ascertain if such discrimination is being made, and, if so, to inform the Attorney-General who shall institute proceedings against such corporation in the Circuit Court of Richmond, and if upon trial by jury the latter is of the opinion that the provisions of the act have been violated, the court shall find the damages to be \$1,000, for which amount judgment shall be rendered, the amount to be turned over to the Treasurer of the State. TO CUT DOWN SALARIES. Mr. A. S. Minter introduced a bill to amend and re-enact section 133 of the Code of Virginia in relation to certain officers and their salaries. The bill proposes to abolish all sections of the Code which name the salaries to be received by the State officers, except section 133, which states the salary to be paid to the Governor. The measure also provides that the salary of any clerk employed by such officers shall, after the passage of this act, be fixed by the Legislature. The measure simply places before the Legislature the question of reducing all the salaries of the State officers, if necessary. TO ESTABLISH STATE BANKS. Mr. J. C. Featherston introduced, by request, a bill to allow free and independent banking in Virginia. The object of the bill is "to give the citizens of Virginia the right to the liberty to organize banks, clothed and invested with the powers of a sovereign State, subject only to the limitations and restrictions of the Federal Constitution, and the acts of Congress passed in pursuance thereof." Mr. Charles Smith introduced a bill to amend section 13 of the Code in relation to the taking of oysters, so that any one holding fifty contiguous acres of oyster lands may dredge on them. COUNTIES TO BEAR EXPENSES. Mr. Embrey introduced a bill amending several sections of the Code so as to provide that all counties and corporations shall bear the town expenses connected with misdemeanors in these counties and corporations. Under the proposed amendment each county and corporation shall bear their expenses in misdemeanors, but the State, as it does not, shall pay the expenses of all felonies. WANTS CLAY'S NAME ON IT. Mr. C. M. Wallace, Jr., offered a resolution providing that the Register of the Land Office be requested to have the name of Henry Clay properly carved upon the base of the statue of Henry Clay, now standing in the Capitol Square. The House concurred in the Senate amendment to Mr. Buford's joint resolution providing for the appointment of a committee to investigate the Brunswick judgeship. INTRODUCED AND REFERRED. The following bills were introduced and referred to the proper committees: By Mr. A. F. Withrow: To regulate the sale of cider in the county of Highland. By Mr. T. D. Jennings: To incorporate the American Industrial Institute. By Mr. S. R. Sayers: For the relief of A. Baritz from a fine. By name: To provide for the working and keeping in repair the roads and bridges of the county of Carroll, and repealing all previous acts in regard to said roads. THE LISTING OF BONDS. Mr. Parks's bill, providing for the listing of bonds, notes, and other evidences of debt, as explained in the Dispatch, came up, and Mr. Anderson moved to reconsider the vote by which the measure was carried to its engrossment on Thursday last. He was not opposed to the measure, but thought that as now drafted it was not in proper shape. He was in favor of postponing the consideration of the measure until after the holidays. Mr. Barley was also opposed to any undue haste in passing upon the measure. He said not believe in taking a stick and driving capital out of the State. The bill was not in proper shape, and should be perfected before being enacted into a law. Mr. Charles Bland, while not opposed to the object of the measure, thought action upon it should be postponed in justice to the members who were not thoroughly acquainted with its provisions. Mr. Carrington and Mr. Charles Mann, Jr., were both in favor of postponing the consideration of the bill. They were not present on Saturday when it was discussed, being absent on a very sad duty, having accompanied the remains of Dr. Nettlet to their last resting-place. THE MOTION LOST. The pending question was called, and the motion to reconsider was at first carried by a vote of 35 to 24. However, called for by Mr. Withrow, when Mr. Anderson's motion was defeated by a vote of 29 to 28. The vote was as follows: For reconsidering—Messrs. Two More Guests for the Penitentiary. The County Court adjourned yesterday for the term, but before this was done Judge Wickham sentenced Ada Watkins, a colored woman, to serve two years each in the penitentiary, they having been convicted of malicious assault. A Royal Warrant has been granted to the Electrical Power Storage Company, Limited, London, appointing them makers of Electrical Secondary Batteries to her Majesty, Queen Victoria. We understand that this is the first Royal Warrant granted to any electrical firm, although electric lighting has been in use at several of the Royal Palaces since 1882.
