Two Danville and Gordonsville Postmasters—Infirmities to South. WASHINGTON, D. C., June 1.—(Special.)—There were two appointments of postmasters in presidential offices made to-day, one of which ends a long and bitter struggle for the office between four candidates. This is the Danville office, and the applicants for it were C. T. Barksdale, W. P. Robertson, J. H. Johnston, and J. E. Pedigo. Mr. Barksdale, who was a McKinley delegate at the St. Louis convention, came out victorious, and will succeed Postmaster Neal, whose term of office expired some weeks ago, and who has made a most enviable record with the department, in one of the highest on the list as an official.

Goschen, First Lord of the British Admiralty. The government is not aware of any increase in the British garrison at Gibraltar. Senor Sagasta said he did not believe that any action had been taken there recently in any way connected with the war."

RESTORNE'S CARGO CONDEMNED.

Case of Steamer To-Day—Charges Against Prize Officials.

KEY WEST, FLA., June 1.—10 P. M.—In the United States Circuit Court to-day Judge Locke ordered the condemnation of the cargo of 2,400 tons of coal on the British steamer Restorne, captured off Santiago harbor on May 21st, while trying to enter, presumably to deliver coal for the Spanish fleet. The case of the steamer will come up to-morrow.

DISASTER OFF CAPE FLATTERY.

Schooner Founders—Thirty-Four of Her 61 Passengers Lost.

SEATTLE, WASH., June 1.—The schooner Jane Gray, which sailed from Seattle for Kotzebue sound May 19th, with sixty-one passengers on board, foundered Sunday, May 23d, about nine miles off Cape Flattery, at 9 o'clock in the morning, while lying to in a moderate gale, under foresail. Ten minutes after the alarm was given she lay at the bottom of the ocean, with thirty-four of her sixty-one passengers. The remainder succeeded in embarking in a launch, and reached this city this evening.
