### CRUISE OF NAVAL MILITIA.

VIRGINIA AND LOUISIANA ACCEPT THE PRAIRIE-FLORIDA IN A DILEMMA.

WASHINGTON, March 24.—Only two of the Southern States which were invited to avail themselves of the cruiser Prairie as a drill-ship for their naval militia have so far accepted. These are Louisiana and Virginia. The Florida militia are in a dilemma. The week's cruise will cost 20 cents per man per day for subsistence or a trifle over \$60 for the 150 men, yet the vessel is being put at the disposal of the Navy Department for the purpose. The Navy Department has no fund applicable to this use, so that unless some public-spirited citizens come to the aid of the militia, their cruise must be abandoned.
