Treasurer Pansten is in receipt daily of checks mailed by subscribers to stock. This is very gratifying, relieving the treasurer of unnecessary worry and the association of the expense and bother of employing a collector. It is urged that all subscribers promptly mail checks for the amounts of their subscriptions.
