ODD-FELLOWS MEET.

GRAND LODGE OF VIRGINIA TO CONVENE ON TUESDAY.

SESSIONS HELD AT HOT SPRINGS.

The Meeting the First One Held Outside of the City—Great Interest in the Meeting of the Sovereign Grand Lodge Here in September.

The sixty-third annual session of the Grand Lodge of Virginia, Independent Order of Odd-Fellows, will be held at Hot Springs, beginning on Tuesday next, at 10 o'clock.

This will be the first time that this body has held an annual meeting, outside of one of the cities, but the fraternalists decide to visit the famous summer resort this year. It is certain that there will be a large gathering, inasmuch as there has been a decided increase in the membership.

The general committee on the entertainment of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, which meets in Richmond the third week in September, has been called to meet at Hot Springs next Tuesday night, and as there are over 300 members of this committee, their meeting will be a large number. Then, too, the Rebekah Assembly, the head of the ladies' branch of the order, will meet at the same time.

The most important business to receive attention at the Grand Lodge will be the consideration of the report of the Executive Board, having in charge the details of arrangements of the Sovereign Grand Lodge meeting. The members of the fraternity all over the State are manifesting much interest in the great gathering to be held in Richmond. Mr. Hill Montague, as chairman of this Executive Board, has been in communication with every lodge in the jurisdiction, and an entertainment fund of \$7,500 is being raised by voluntary contributions. It is proposed to have a grand parade of the order here on September 20th. It is expected that the representatives of the Sovereign Grand Lodge and their ladies will be taken on a special train to Old Point on September 15th, and after a boat ride to the Cape, dinner will be served at the Chamberlain Hotel. Enough requests for rooms have already been received from other States to show that our hotels will be crowded, and overflowing. Besides these visitors, the committee expects at least 5,000 Virginia Odd-Fellows to march in the parade.


