VIRGINIA REJOICES OVER THE CONVENTION VICTORY.

'TIS "ON TO RICHMOND" NEXT YEAR

The State Stands High on the Honor Roll of the National Body—The New Orleans Meeting—This Year's Big Parade.

In local Travellers' Protective Association circles great joy was manifested yesterday over the good news from New Orleans that next year's national convention will be held in Richmond. The rejoicing is not confined to the city. Throughout the State Travellers' Protective Association men felicitate themselves upon the success of the Virginia delegation in landing the convention for the capital city of the Old Dominion.

Richmond's invitation was extended jointly by Post A and the Chamber of Commerce. On Friday night, Colonel John S. Harwood, who had been designated to present the Chamber's invitation, wired back to Mr. L. Z. Morris, president of the Chamber, the acceptance of the convention, and mentioned that Virginia had won over strong bids made by Missouri and Ohio.

Virginia ranks well up at the head of the Travellers' Protective Association's honor roll. Richmond has fared well at the hands of the national body. Mr. Joseph Wallerstein, of this city, has served as president of the national association. Colonel John S. Harwood is serving a second term as chairman of the National Legislative Committee—the most important committee post in the organization—and now comes the choice of Richmond as the convention city.
