PARDON FOR THOMAS.

GOV. TYLER SETS FREE THE FORMER TREASURER OF MATHEWS.

With a Meeting of Their Club. New Superintendent of Schools of Radford-Capitol Notes.

Gov. Tyler granted a pardon yesterday to L. C. Thomas, convicted of embezzlement in the County Court of Mathews last week.

Thomas was Treasurer of the county, and was short in his accounts at final settlement. He made good the full amount of the shortage when he surrendered the office to Mr. G. E. T. Lane, who defeated him for re-election last year.

The pardon was obtained by Mr. McCallister of Radford, who had called to see Governor Tyler yesterday and presented a petition from the trial judge, the prosecuting attorney, and all the jury which convicted Thomas, asking that he be pardoned.

The pardon was granted by the officials of the county also signed the petition. The Judge and Commonwealth's Attorney said the offence of Thomas was purely technical, and that while the jury was bound to find him guilty, they thought it a case demanding the exercise of executive clemency.

Eddie Moody, of Nottoway, sentenced to two years' for house-breaking, has been pardoned by the Governor. Moody had been kept in jail seven months as a witness. The Governor thought he had been sufficiently punished.
