DEFLECTION OF TEN CONGRESSMEN

AND A GREAT BRYAN MAJORITY.

IN THE NINTH DISTRICT.

A Conference of Leaders Held There

Yesterday—Senator Daniel and Mr.

Montague in Demand—Some Brief

Campaign Notes.

The progress of the Virginia campaign,

from a Democratic standpoint, is as sat-

isfactory as could well be wished. The

Democratic candidates for Congress will

be elected in every district in the State.

A solid Democratic delegation in the next

House of Representatives seems a cer-

tainty. The majority which Virginia will

give for Bryan is estimated at anywhere

from 20,000 to 40,000.

quarters yesterday, being in Bristol to

attend a meeting of the Ninth District

Committee.

After a speech at Logansport, Ind., on

the 24th instant, Senator Daniel will

depart for the Ninth District. It is

generally concluded, but the Democrats

of the district wish to put as big a major-

ity in General Walker as possible.

His Estate Valued at \$56,700—News

of the City Courts.

\$25,000 life insurance. Mrs. Lucy T. S.

as executrix.
