ALEXANDRIA DEMOCRATS. To Have a Barbecue—Thinks He Was Murdered. ALEXANDRIA, Va., October 6.—(Special.)—Several prominent Democrats met yesterday morning in the office of Mr. C. C. Carlin and made arrangements for a grand barbecue and mass-meeting, to be held on the old Fair-Grounds the sixth instant. Mr. Carlin was elected chairman, and committees were appointed. The Bryan, Stevenson, and Rixey Campaign Club and the City Committee will cooperate. It is expected that Senator Martin, Representatives Swanson and Rixey, and Judge J. B. McCabe, of Loudoun, will deliver addresses. Mr. Charles Howard, whose son, Edward W.
