To vote for Bryan and Stevenson scratch off your ticket the names of all other candidates for President and Vice-President. Such a ballot will be counted as if the names of the electors had been scratched.

HOW TO PREPARE A BALLOT. The "Australian ballot" you are to vote to-day should be prepared in the same manner that you prepare a Democratic primary election ticket in Richmond—that is to say, you should scratch off the names of those candidates for whom you do "not" wish to vote.

But in the case of votes for President and Vice-President, if, for instance, the names of all other candidates are scratched off except those of Bryan and Stevenson the ballot will be counted for those two. In other words, if the names of presidential and vice-presidential candidates are erased, the names of their proposed electors need not be.

TO VOTE FOR JOHN LAMB ALL YOU HAVE TO DO IS TO SCRATCH OFF THE NAME OF EDGAR ALLAN. You may vote for congressman without voting for President or Vice-President.

DON'T FALL OUT OF LINE. The Baltimore Sun does not wish Baltimore and Maryland to estrange themselves from the South by giving countenance to the Republicans. Nor do we desire Richmond and Virginia to be put into that predicament.

If the Republicans have full and complete control of all branches of the government after March 4th, we may look for them to set to work to punish the solid South. The way they propose doing it is by waging a revengeful war on those States which have disfranchised the negro or suppressed his vote.

ALLAN'S AUTHORITY. We take occasion to repeat to-day what we said Sunday, that United States District-Attorney Edgar Allan has no more authority over officers of election than any other citizen of Virginia. All force bills have been repealed, and election officers are responsible "not to Federal courts, but to State courts".
