Convict Lease System.

The report carries with it a bill providing that State convicts shall be controlled and employed by the sub-leases prices in excess of the prices the original contractor leased them, which latter prices ranged from \$60 to \$150 per year for each convict.

After running twenty-five minutes at the rate of over 27 knots, owing to the breaking of a feed-pipe, it was decided to stop the trial and make another attempt Saturday.

Army for the Philippines.

War Department Thinks 50,000 Men Will Be Enough. WASHINGTON, D. C., April 4--(Special).--The improved conditions in the Philippines make it practically certain that there will be a smaller army than was anticipated. The maximum strength will be about 75,000. Secretary Root has decided to raise just 20 per cent. of the authorized increase in the artillery.
