BOSTON HAD TO WORK

"GRAYS" PLAYED SPLENDID GAME.

Although it was the second time Barley Kain's "Grays" were together, they made the Boston National League team work like veterans to win the game yesterday afternoon at Broad-Street Park.

The local club played like first-class men, and if they keep such ball as they played yesterday and the day before, the Richmond base-ball-loving public will have a club to be proud of.

The features of the game was the batting of Bigbie and the excellent fielding of both clubs.

The "Grays" were put out in the first five innings in one-two-three order.

In the sixth, Warner singled and Manner lined out a beauty. Bishop sacrificed, advancing Warner and Manner to base. It was then that Bigbie set the 700 spectators wild by making a home-run drive, clearing the bases and making the score 6 to 3.

In the ninth Traeger lined out another for three bases. It was a drive to deep right field. Singler, Traeger and McGone brought him home. The game ended by Warner hitting a hot grounder to first, which was fielded by Tenny.

WORK OF THE VISITORS. The visitors began their work with a double in the fifth inning by Hamilton, Tenny went out on a fly to Soffie, Berry and Demontreuil singled, Crollous and Long went out on flies to the outfield, leaving Berry on the third base.

In the fifth, Berry singled and went to second on an error. Crollous's short hit and Long went out on a drive to Soffie, who threw to Thomas. Love singled, stole second, and came home on Moran's single.

Moran attempted to steal. Manner threw to Kain on second, but Soffie was there, nabbed the ball, and returned it to Kain before Moran, who had over-run the bag, could recover himself.

The play was one of the swiftest ever seen on the local grounds. It brought a terrific applause from everybody, including all of the Boston players.

In the seventh the "Beaneaters" scored their last run. Crollous went out on a grounder to short. Long singled and went to second on an error. Lowe went on to second ball to Captain Soffie, and Long scored.

"R. E. Lee Camp, No. 1, Confederate Veterans, held their regular meeting last night, Commander Joseph C. Dickerson presiding.


A communication was received from the Oakwood Memorial Association to attend the service to be celebrated within the walls of a cloister and has accepted.
