CHAS. L. COCKE DEAD

BELOVED PRESIDENT OF HOLLINS PASSES AWAY IN ROANOKE.

EDUCATOR AND PHILANTHROPIST

His End Was Peaceful—Sketch of His Life and Something About His Good Works—What He Did for the Baptist Orphanage.

ROANOKE, Va., May 4.—(Special).—Dr. Charles L. Cocke, the venerable president of Hollins Institute, is no more. He passed peacefully away at 10:15 o'clock this morning, after a long illness, at the home of his son, Mr. Leiden H. Cocke.

The great educator's mind was perfectly clear and vigorous until within twelve hours of his death, and his end was very tranquil.

The body will remain at his son's home until Monday morning, when it will be taken to Hollins.

Services will be held in the chapel at 11 o'clock for the faculty and students, and at noon church funeral services will be held at Hollins.

The following members of the faculty of Hollins Institute will be active pallbearers: Dr. A. T. L. Kusan, Professor Louis Albert, Professor J. M. McBryde, Professor Charles H. Elwell, Professor Frank W. Duke, Professor A. A. Macke, Professor Carl Bodell, and Dr. G. W. Drake.

The honorary pallbearers are Mr. Charles Lunford, Professor William H. Pleasants, Colonel Thomas Lewis, Dr. J. D. Dreher, Mr. Michael Graybill, Mr. William Ellison, Dr. Leleh Buckner, Mr. John W. Moffett, Dr. H. W. Harrison, Hon. J. Allen W. Mason, Mr. Myers, Captain James C. Langhorne, Mr. Frank S. Chulmers, and Judge Henry E. Charles L. Cocke was born at Edge Hill, in King William county, Va., on the 21st of February, 1828. He received his early education at Professor Dabney's high school, in King William county.

After graduation from the University of Washington, D. C., from which institution he was graduated with the Master of Arts degree.

Most immediately after his graduation he became connected with Richmond College as Associate Professor of Mathematics, and was also in charge of the boarding department of the college.

On the 31st day of December, 1846, he married Susanna Virginia Pleasants, a daughter of Joseph Pleasants, of Piquette, in Henrico county, who survives him.

In 1845 he was invited to come to Roanoke, where he was in charge of the school which was then known as the Valley Union Seminary, located at "Dotteron Springs," the property then being in the practical control of Colonel George P. Taylor.

As a result of this visit was the undertaking on his part to take charge of the institution, which he did in the month of June, 1846, having personally arranged for the satisfaction of the indebtedness of the seminary, which at that time threatened its existence.

The institution had been arranged for the co-education of the sexes, and under the management of the Executive Committee, which at that time threatened its existence.

During the entire period of his life, Dr. Cocke has been most actively engaged in every effort to advance religious and philanthropic enterprise.

He has been an active member of the Baptist denomination, and connected with every work of that denomination. More especially has his splendid influence been felt in connection with the work of that denomination in the southwest Virginia.

It was, perhaps, as much due to his efforts as to any one individual's that the Baptist Orphanage at Salem was built.

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NARROW ESCAPE

OF A FAMILY FROM A BURNING HOUSE.

THE BUILDING WAS ALL AFLAME

When the inmates awoke—Husband May Lose a Hand—Death of a Well-Known Lady—Want County to Contribute.

WINCHESTER, Va., May 4.—(Special).—Mr. B. M. Dawes and family, consisting of his wife and daughter, and a Miss Deming, a guest, narrowly escaped being burned up while asleep in the Dawes home, at Bartonville, near here, early this morning. A pan of hot ashes placed on the porch the afternoon before set fire to the house during the night. Nearly the entire building was in flames before the inmates awoke. All were nearly suffocated by smoke, but the young lady and Mr. Dawes managed to reach the open air. Alarmed at Mrs. Dawes' failure to appear, they rushed back into the house and found her unconscious at the foot of the stairs, down which she had fallen. Mr. Dawes and Miss Dawes were seriously burned in rescuing the unconscious woman. The former will probably lose a hand. Mrs. Dawes was seriously injured by the fall, besides being badly burned. Her condition to-night is critical. All the family escaped, clad in their night clothes, and sought refuge at a neighbor's. Nothing was saved from the building. The loss is \$3,000, with \$500 insurance.

Mrs. Martha S. Hardesty, wife of Mr. Joseph R. Hardesty, a prominent business-man of Berryville, died this afternoon, after a brief illness, of the spinal meningitis, following a stroke of apoplexy. She was born in Winchester sixty-five years ago, and was a daughter of the late John H. Richardson.

Mr. Alex B. Kline, a well-known farmer, died last night at Vaucuse, in this county, after a long illness. He was 69 years of age, and leaves a widow and two sons—Harvey Kline and Thomas Kline, both of the county.

A movement was inaugurated here last night by the Fire Department to have the county authorities provide fire hose for the use of the city department in protecting suburban property from destruction. The corporate bounds of Winchester are contracted, and there are over a thousand people in the county, residing in the suburbs, the majority of which are entirely dependent upon Winchester for fire protection.

The city has made provision only for itself in this particular, and the county will be asked to contribute to the equipment of the Fire Department, that adequate protection will be afforded the suburbanites against fire. The action was the outcome of the failure of the present facilities to well-effective work at the disastrous Allemon's planing-mill fire this week.

Some Return to Work—Newport News to Help Fire Sufferers.

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., May 4.—(Special).—A number of union longshoremen, who have been on a strike for the past two weeks, will be returning to-day. The Business-Men's Association will raise funds for the relief of sufferers from the strike.

President Barrett said to-day that the work would be taken up at once. An appeal for help has not been made, but it is apparent one will have to be, and the people of Newport News will be among the first to respond.

Considerable more than \$1,000 was sent from here to the Galveston sufferers. Work has just been started on the new line of the Hampton Roads Railway and Electric Company, between this city and Old Point. The power-house is already under way.
